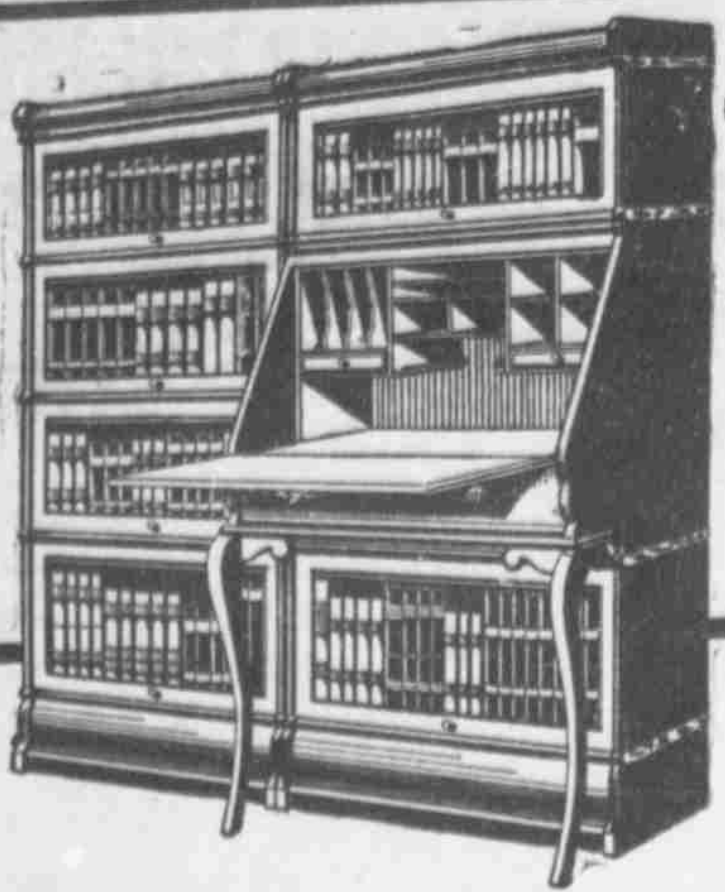

ESTABLISH INDIRECT TAXATION

Meetings will be held at Turner on Thursday evening and at Jefferson Saturday evening to promote indirect taxation. The people are becoming aroused on this question, and realize that there will be no reduction of the high state tax without an effort on their part. The tax last year was \$6.20 on the \$1000, and no telling what the next legislature will demand of the taxpayers. The fight for indirect taxation is going to be made until the state tax is wiped out on the farms and homes and personal property of the people. County taxes and school and city taxes are local and can be better understood, and there is no good reason for a direct tax on the property of the citizen to carry on the state government, if it can be raised in other ways. It took four years to get the flat salary law established and put all the fees collected by the state officials into the city treasury. But next January that law goes into effect, and with the extension of indirect taxation there will soon be money enough going into the state treasury to run the state government. The people must make this fight and stand up for men who will stand for this principle, regardless of party.

Sign Everything.

Ed. Journal: The petition is abroad in the land. The man with a constitutional amendment petition and the ubiquitous candidate is in our midst, until the life of the average citizen is one vast sea of trouble, with constant requests to sign a petition for something or somebody. The only way for us to get our candidate or our measure before the people is for everybody to sign every petition that is presented to him, and discriminate at the polls. There is nothing to prevent anybody from signing as many petitions for as many candidates or as many measures as he chooses. Therefore, it is advisable for everybody to carry a fountain pen or indelible pencil in his pocket, and sign everything. The direct primary is a good thing.

The gang of 20 Greeks who became rebellious and threatened to take the life of the O. R. & N. section foreman, near Pendleton a few days ago, has been discharged, and a gang of 25 Italians has taken its place.
