Will Import Italians in Tennessee. Memphis, Tenn., Jan. 10.—The experiment of Col. Maxwell, the largest individual cotton planter in Louisiana, with importing Italian families on his plantation for the purpose of obtaining laborers in his cotton fields, proved so successful that it is probable that an effort will be made not only in Louisiana, but also in Tennessee and other Southern states, to import Italian laborers to supplant the negroes working in the cotton fields. Colonel Maxwell imported twenty-one Italian families last summer, and they proved of the greatest value. He was so well pleased with his experiment that he has decided to fill every cabin on his plantation with Italians as rapidly as possible. He firmly believes that the importation of Italian laborers and their families would definitely and satisfactorily settle the cotton labor problem. The movement is rapidly spreading in other cotton states and an effort will be made to bring a large number of Italians to the Cotton belt.

YAKIMA READY FOR GOVERNMENT

Water Rights Are All Adjusted and Valley is Ripe for Irrigation

A Yakima dispatch of Monday says: Water rights in Yakima valley have been adjusted. The state has been wiped clean as demanded by Secretary E. A. Hitchcock before he would take up any irrigation projects in this valley. This removes practically all obstacles, and work on the projects approved will begin about April 1st.

A report to this effect was sent to the state delegation at Washington today, to be given to the secretary of the interior. Engineer Jacobs, of the reclamation service here, will at once forward report ratifying the statement of the committee.

Will Water 300,000 Acres.

This committee has been at work for three months. There was a shortage of 137 cubic feet of water a second in the valley. This had to be made up, and the ditch owners gave up their water so as to procure governmental irrigation for the valley.

With the turning down of the claim of State Land Commissioner Ross for the approval of the Carey land selections, which will be done, the way will now be entirely clear in Yakima for the government to go ahead with its irrigation projects.

This is considered a great achievement for the people of North Yakima, who have spent much time in getting the matter adjusted. It means watering by government works nearly 300,000 acres in the Yakima valley. The project to be commenced first will be the Tietan, west of this city. There are 27,000 acres under this canal. With the settlement of the water right question goes the purchase of the Sunnyside irrigation system by the government. This, when extended, will water an additional 100,000 acres. There will also be a large body of land on the reservation to come under the new systems.

The first construction work will be the damming of a pumping lake, to furnish water for the Naches river to make up for the amount that will be taken out of the Tietan river for the Tietan project.

Chicago, Jan. 9.—Promoters of the movement to secure state building laws are greatly encouraged by the favorable reception of their plan.
