## FOR PROTECTION OF FORESTS

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 10.—One of the most important meetings in the interests of systematic forestry in Canada ever held in this country met here today in response to an invitation issued by Sir Wilfred Laurier last month. The meeting is held under the auspices of the Canadian forestry association and was called for the purpose of considering the status of the forests of the dominion and the means necessary for their preservation.

Sir Wilfred Laurier, who acts as the presiding officer of the convention, personally opened the session and delivered an address in which he called attention to the great importance of the forestry problem in Canada and the United States. He pointed out that the virgin forests of Canada are one of her best and most valuable assets and anything that can be done to preserve them and increase their value would add to the wealth of the country. The value of forests products in 1901, according to the last census, was \$51,000,000, and provincial governments which control their own lands derived large revenues from their forests.

Several other interesting addresses were delivered, giving a history of the forestry movement in Canada. The question of preservation and reforestation was agitated for many years by Sir Joly de Lotbiniere, William Little of Westmont and others, and in 1882 a forest congress was convened in Montreal, representing the United States and Canada, and during the two or three days' session of the convention many valuable papers were read. The result was by no means satisfactory, however. Although the proceedings of the convention were well reported in the newspapers, and many good editorials on the subject were written, the interest in the subject soon died out, as no sustained effort was made to keep the matter before the people.

At last, however, the American forest congress was organized, which body met in Quebec in 1892. The most far reaching result of that convention was the adoption of the fire ranging system, which has done so much to preserve the forests of Canada from destruction by fire. From time to time the different provincial governments adopted certain measures for the preservation of the forests, but there was no concerted action and no systematic effort for the accomplishment of the important task. Not until the Canadian forest association was organized in 1899 was any concerted effort made to induce the various provincial governments to join their efforts in the common cause. So persistent was the Canadian Forestry association in its efforts that the federal government at last saw fit to place the stamp of its official recognition upon the work of the association and to call together the delegates to the convention are many prominent officials of the various provincial governments, members of the various legislative councils and legislative assemblies of the provinces, representatives of the lumbermen's associations, of boards of trade, universities and agricultural colleges, farmers' institutes, railway companies, mining institutes, fish and game associations and many other similar institutions in some way interested in the preservation of the forests.

The main divisions in which the subject will be considered will include the national interest in the forest, the relations of the forest and the lumber pulp and other industries of the country, forestry in relation to agriculture, the influence of the forests on water power and irrigation and forestry education. The bureau of forestry of the United States, the American association and the forestry bureau and associations of various states are also represented by delegates. The convention will last three days.

### For Indirect Taxes

G. P. Sherwood brought in the first list of signers for the indirect taxation bill, with 100 signers to the initiative petitions, composed of the representative business men of the city. He is circulating another, and there are many more out. The work should be rushed and the names got in in the next two weeks. The county clerks have to attest the names as being those of registered voters at the election two years ago or this year. As this bill in a few years will make an annual state tax levy of at least one million dollars per annum unnecessary, every voter who signs it is helping the taxpayer \$100 per year. If you have not signed get your name on the petition, as there are many in circulation in the county, or call at this office and sign.

### A Small But Fair Correction.

Leo R. Minard, who was arrested with Mrs. Martha Reid and bound over to the circuit court on the charge of lewd cohabitation, was interviewed by a Journal reporter today, and desires to have a mistake corrected, that was made in reporting the case yesterday. It was stated that a woman, Mrs. Eva Davenport, had been killed in his saloon at Cottage Grove about a year ago, and that an unsuccessful attempt had been made to connect Minard with the crime. He says the woman committed suicide in her own house, which was on the other side of the block from where his saloon was located, and that it was only by accident that he discovered the woman dying, and broke in the door to render what assistance he could. He said that the grand jury made a full investigation, discovering where and when the poison had been purchased by the woman, and brought in a verdict of suicide. ## VIAL TO STAND TRIAL

Governor Chamberlain today issued a requisition on the governor of Washington for Leon L. Vial, who is wanted at Roseburg for shooting a woman about a year ago. Vial has been in hiding in Spokane for the past eight months and yesterday gave himself up to the officers of that city. Sheriff H. T. McCallen, of Douglas county, was given the requisition papers, and will leave for Spokane on the afternoon train.

Vial is a Portland man, being the son of Mrs. Louis P. Vial, of 155 Johnson street, who is at present a guest at the Palace Hotel, in San Francisco. When Vial got into his trouble in Douglas county his relatives furnished bail; then the young man suddenly disappeared. Mrs. L. G. Dumbleton, the woman he shot, has recovered from her wounds.

The story of the shooting for which Vial was indicted, as received by telegraph at the time, was that about noon of March 21, 1905, Mrs. L. G. Dumbleton, wife of a prominent citizen, was shot and severely wounded at her home at Winchester five miles north of Roseburg, Or., by Leon G. Vial. Vial came home partially intoxicated, and had an altercation with his wife, who had left him a week previously on account of ill-treatment.

Hearing Mrs. Vial make an outcry Mrs. Dumbleton opened the door. Vial's wife fled and Vial fired at her, missing his wife, but the ball hit Mrs. Dumbleton, entering her abdomen.

## IT HAS NO BIG SCANDAL

The Farmers' Fire Relief Association of Sublimity, Or., held its tenth annual session at Sublimity, Jan. 8. The secretary read his report, showing what had been done during the year. Five policies were increased, new policies were issued, insurance buildings and their contents for amount of \$21,941.

There are at present 186 policies in force, insuring 366 buildings and contents for the amount of \$110,000. The association has been doing business for over nine years, and at that time it has had but two fires for this amount of \$760. The amount of cost for fire losses was \$1,500 per \$1000, or 15 cents per year.

The following officers were elected: President, Charles Fischer, Sublimity; secretary and treasurer, Chas. H. Smith, Whiteaker; directors, Meritt Stayton; P. C. Freres, Klumb; J. Stupfel, Mt. Angel, and Aug. A. Aumsville; special solicitors, R. J. Ten, Kingston; John Bender, J. F. L. Pound, Aumsville; Oliver B. Argenti; William Smith, Mt. Angel; and John Buhr, Mt. Angel. The organization is to be organized upon its success in this work. Its members are all laborers, citizens and farmers, and they are pushing this work to a successful thereby insuring their property.
