Directions for Election.

The adoption of the direct primary law has given Oregon such a complicated system of elections that not even the accomplished politician can carry in his mind all the details of the proceedings leading up to the general election of the state, District and county officers. One of the most difficult things to ascertain and remember is the dates upon which the various steps in the nomination and election of officers must be taken. In fact the ordinary citizen cannot figure out the date if he has the statute before him, for the language varies and different methods of computing time must be adopted.

Secretary of State Dunbar and Attorney-General Crawford have examined the election laws and computed the time within which petitions must be filed, notices given and other business conducted in preparation for the election.

It will be seen that the campaign of 1906 really begins during the last week in December of this year, when initiative petitions must be filed if the promoters desire to file pamphlets in support of the proposed measures. The pamphlets must be brought to the office of Secretary of State Dunbar by December 30. If the promoters of measures do not file pamphlets, they will have until February 3 to file petitions.

It should also be explained that petitions for nominations for district offices, such as circuit judge, district attorney, joint senator, and joint representative, must be filed in the office of the secretary of state, and not in the office of county clerks, and the dates governing nominations for state offices are applicable. GENERAL ELECTION, JUNE 4.

France is becoming depopled. Its population simply remains stationary, or nearly so. The recent census shows that France has gained about half a million in the quinquennial period of 1896-1901. On analysis, however, it is seen that the excess of births over deaths is only 341,000. That, therefore, is really the growth of population during the five years. The other quarter of a million is to be accounted for by immigration and a lowered death rate.

In the December Nineteenth Century Charles Dawharn deals with the situation in France and gives figures to prove conclusions that have before been hinted at. Quoting from an extra parliamentary commission's report, Mr. Dawharn shows that the stationary character of the population is not due to physiological causes. "The proportion of sterile marriages in France (13.3 per cent) is practically the same as elsewhere; neither is the marriage rate sensibly lower (France 7.52 per thousand; Germany 8.18; Great Britain and Ireland, 7.40; Italy, 7.32). To what, then, must we attribute the inferiority of the birth rate? To the small number of households in which a family of more than two or three children is to be found. The number of families in which there is only one child is most significant. Out of every thousand families, 249 have one child only, 224 two children and 150 three. Only thirty-one per thousand have six children and twenty-seven seven and over. Generally speaking, there is no pathological reason for such restricted families."

There is no proof of unfruitfulness in the race. The restriction is voluntary, and enforced by local opinion. The real motive is love of economy. Where the population is prevalent, the families are small; where impoverished, they are large. The writer thinks that France has not arrived in advance at a point to which all the civilized states are surely traveling. "Are we to suppose that the French are wanting in the family instinct? No one who has had opportunities of studying French 'interiors' in various states of society could ever suppose that. On the contrary, no people systematically lavish more care and attention upon their offspring. The reason of the dislike of large families is rooted in another national characteristic—the love of economy. Economical in everything, the Frenchman economizes in his children. It is the influence of the bankrupt that affects the population curve. A series of remarkable investigations undertaken in Scandinavian countries, and afterward extended to France, prove more conclusively that the birth rate is in direct relation with the economic spirit of the people. Mr. Tallquist's inquiries concerned fire insurance, but the same conclusions are to be drawn from the balance sheets of the local state and private banks. Where the spirit of saving is most highly developed, these families are most restricted."—Public Opinion.

Big Coal Mine Deal Consummated. Pittsburgh, Pa., Jan. 11.—As the result of long negotiations E. P. Mucklow of this city today became the owner of all the coal mines in the Point creek, West Virginia, district, with the exception of the Detroit and Imperial mines. The price paid for the property was \$6,000,000. It is understood that extensive improvements will be made under the new owner and that several new mines will be opened on the property. The coal lands purchased by Mr. Mucklow are situated in Wayne, Raleigh and Kenosha counties. This is the first step in a great consolidation of West Virginia coal properties, which, it is understood, has been contemplated for some time.

Will Help Swiss Industries. Bern, Switzerland, Jan. 11.—There is great rejoicing throughout the Swiss federation over the proclamation of President Roosevelt, conferring upon imports from Switzerland to the U. S. a crude tariff, still wines, vermouth, brandies and works of art the reductions provided for in Section 3 of the Dingley act. The new arrangement is the result of negotiations for a reciprocity convention between the U. S. and Switzerland and its granting was preceded by the voluntary announcement of the Swiss government to extend the favored nation treatment to American imports, without, at the same time, preferring any request whatever for a return of similar preferences on the part of the American government. It is believed that this new arrangement will be of the greatest benefit to Swiss industries.
