WORLD'S PETROLEUM PRODUCT

The United States supplied more than one-half of the petroleum produced in the world in 1904. A statement of the world's production of petroleum, prepared by the British board of trade, which has just reached the bureau of statistics of the department of commerce and labor, puts the petroleum production of the world in 1904 at 9,302,000,000 gallons, of which 4,916,000,000 gallons were produced in the United States, 3,650,000,000 gallons in Russia, 202,500,000 in Austria, 105,500,000 in Java and Sumatra, 133,000,000 in Roumania, 105,500,000 in British India (principally Burma), 49,000,000 in Japan, 20,000,000 in Canada and 18,500,000 in Germany.

These figures give the grand total of 9,302,000,000 gallons of petroleum production in 1904, a total which far exceeds that of any earlier year. In 1903, which made the highest record of any year prior to 1904, the total was but 8,504,000,000; in 1902 it was 7,558,000,000. This increase in 1903 and 1904 occurs chiefly in the United States. The figures of production in the United States show an increase of about 697,000,000 gallons in 1904 over the figures of 1903, while those of Russia, our chief competitor in oil production, show an increase of but 103,000,000 gallons over 1903, and the increase in the United States in 1903 is also much larger than that of Russia. In the four years, 1898, 1899, 1900 and 1901, Russian production of crude petroleum exceeded that of the United States, but in all other years for which the record is shown by the publication in question extending from 1883 to 1904, the production of the United States exceeds that of Russia, and by far exceeds that of any other country. Indeed, it may be said that the United States and Russia produce practically nine-tenths of the petroleum of the world, the total production in 1904, as above shown, being 9,302,000,000 gallons, of which 8,566,000,000 was produced in the United States and Russia combined.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED DRAIN IN NORTH SALEM. Notice is hereby given that the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, by a resolution duly made at an adjourned regular meeting thereof held on the 29th day of December, 1905, deems it expedient and proposes to lay and construct a drain in North Salem, as follows:

One ten inch tile from the east end of Division street in North Salem, westerly along said Division street to Sixth street westerly along said Division street with two ten inch tile to Commercial street; thence with two ten inch tile northerly along Commercial street to North street; also, commencing in said North Salem at the intersection of Capital and North streets, and running thence westerly along said North street with two ten inch tile to Commercial street and joining said four ten inch tile drains at said intersection of Commercial and North streets into two twelve inch tile drains and continuing said two twelve inch drains westerly along said North street to the Willamette river. Said drains to be so laid and constructed at the expense of the property owners benefited thereby and the cost thereof assessed upon the property directly benefited thereby as prescribed by the charter and the ordinances of said city.

This notice is published ten days by order of the common council, the date of the first publication being the 1st day of January, 1906, and remonstrances against the above named improvement may be filed with the undersigned within ten days after the final publication of this notice.

TO UNITE ALL THE CHURCHES

At Hillsboro, January 3, an effort was made to arrange for the organization of and unification of the churches, as follows. A report has been sent to the leaders of the various church denominations by the committee appointed to draft a statement of principles and constitution for church federation. It will be acted upon in February.

We recommend the following as a reasonable statement of the principles which should guide in forming such a federation as we contemplate.

Recognizing the evident desire of the various churches of Oregon to do more efficient work for our common

Lord and believing that the Holy Spirit is moving Christians toward practical co-operation, we desire to affirm our convictions as follows:

Convictions Affirmed.

I. That the churches in the cities and larger towns ought to co-operate so far as possible in their work.

II. That church extension in neglected communities should be conducted as far as practicable, according to the following considerations:

1. No community, in which any denomination has any legitimate claim, should be entered by any other denomination through its official agencies, without conference with the denomination, or denominations, having said claims.

2. A feeble church should be revived, if possible, rather than a new one organized, to become its rival.

3. The preference of a community should always be regarded by denominational committees, missionary agents and individual workers.

4. These denominations having churches nearest at hand should, other things being equal, be recognized as in the most advantageous position to encourage and aid a new enterprise in their vicinity.

5. In case one denomination begins work in a neglected community, it should be left to develop that work without other denominational interference.

6. Temporary suspension of church work by any denomination occupying a field should not be deemed sufficient warrant, in itself, for entrance into that field by another denomination.

Temporary suspension should be deemed abandonment when a church has ceased to hold regular services.

7. All question of interpretation of the foregoing statements, and all cases of friction between denominations, or churches, should be referred to the executive committee.

Constitution.

Article I. Name.—This organization shall be called the Federation of Evangelical churches of the state of Oregon.

Article II. Object.—The object of the federation shall be:

1. To express the fellowship and catholic unity of the Christian church.

2. To encourage devotional fellowship and mutual counsel concerning the spiritual life and religious activities of the churches.

3. To secure a larger combined influence for the churches of Christians in all matters affecting the moral and social conditions of the people, so as to permit the application of the law of Christ in every relation of human life.

4. To promote co-operation in the organization and maintenance of churches in the state of Oregon; to prevent waste of resources and effort; and to stimulate missionary work in neglected regions.

Article III. The Council.—The denominations forming this federation shall act through a state council consisting of three members from each denomination, elected by their respective bodies.

Article IV. Officers.—The officers of the council shall be a president, vice president and secretary, who shall be the treasurer. These officers shall hold office for one year, or until their successors are elected.

Article V. Executive Committee.—There shall be an executive committee elected by the council, consisting of one from each denomination, of which committee the president and secretary shall be members and in which they shall act in their respective capacities. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to consider questions of comity which shall be submitted to them and to make recommendations. The recommendations of the executive committee shall be binding upon the denominations forming the federation, except that appeal may be taken to the council, whose decisions shall be final.

Vacancies in the executive committee shall be filled by members of the council representing the denomination wherein the vacancy occurs.

The executive committee shall meet at the call of the president and secretary or at the request of any two members representing different denominations and upon its own adjournment.

Article VI. Meetings of the Council.—The council shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as shall be determined by the executive committee. Special meetings of the council may be called at any time by the president or at the request of three members.

Article VII. Quorum.—Seven members of the council shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, not less than four denominations being represented.

The executive committee shall decide upon its own quorum.

Article VIII. Amendments.—This constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the council by a two-thirds vote of the members present.
