COTTAGE GROVE MEETING

The committee on arrangements of the Albany Commercial Club met this afternoon at the office of President Ellis, with Colonel E. Hofer, president of the Willamette Valley Development League, to make a program for the convention of the league to be held here on January 24-25. Those present were President Ellis, Secretary Roberts and Messrs. Sox Tomlinson and Schmitt. The committee decided on three programs—Wednesday at 1:30 p. m., Wednesday evening, and Thursday morning at 8:30. The club will probably give the visiting guests and delegates a banquet Wednesday evening. Committees are to be named on reception, badges and decorations, transportation and entertainment. Prominent topics for discussion will be "An Open Willamette River and Free Locks," "Extension of the Corvallis and Eastern," "Improvement of Yaquina Bay," "The Willamette Valley Electric Railroad," "Higher Education," and "Coos Bay." There are to be papers and addresses and more full discussion of the topics presented than at any of the previous conventions. One of the Harriman officials will be invited to address the convention. New topics to be taken up are the land grants of the Southern Oregon Company and of the Oregon Wagon Road Company, and some interesting information will be given out on those great land monopolies. Colonel Hofer said that Silverton asked for a development and a good roads convention February 14-15, and North Bend, Coos county, wanted a farmers' and shippers' congress to be held May 25-26. From this it appears that the conventions of the league are growing in demand.

Colonel Hofer Speaks.

Colonel Hofer of the Development League spoke interestingly of the work of the organization and what its aim and objects were. Referring to suggestions regarding his political activity, he said last night:

"While I have some friends among the candidates for office, and naturally have some preferences, as any man with a particle of blood in him ought to have, I am not managing any candidate's campaign, and believe the people ought to nominate the ticket from constable to United States Senator. I am fighting for the principle of indirect taxation, as I believe the state tax is altogether too high and should be wiped out. The people should put up a ticket of state officials who stand for that principle, and cut out every dollar of graft in the state government. I believe the United States Senator should be nominated and elected by a direct vote of the people, and members of the legislature should respect their choice. Beyond doing my utmost as a citizen for indirect taxation and direct election of senators, I have nothing to say as to who should go on the republican ticket. We have had direct taxation and indirect election of senators long enough. Let us reverse the process and see if we will not get a more satisfactory result."
