VIRGINIA IS OUR FASTEST SHIP.

Largest Additions Ever Made to Our Navy Will Come in 1906.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 12.—This year the United States navy not only makes its greatest gain in ships—it also adds to our fighting strength the most efficient, the fastest, and the best equipped warships ever floated.

Before the year is out seven big battle ships, four armored cruisers and two protected cruisers will be added to the United States navy, if the present rate of construction is maintained. This will be the greatest increase in any one year of the history of the American navy, and it will advance materially the rank of the United States as a world power.

All the new vessels represent the highest type and all that is modern in naval architecture. The battleships to be added within the year are the Virginia, Nebraska, Georgia, New Jersey, Rhode Island, Connecticut and Louisiana. The two last named have a tonnage of 10,000 each, while the other five have a tonnage of 14,948 each.

The four armored cruisers are the California and South Dakota, of 12,650 tons each, and the Tennessee and Washington, of 14,000 each; while the protected cruisers are the St. Louis and Milwaukee, of 9700 tons each.

For the present at least the Virginia holds the battleship record of 19.10 knots, made during a four hour run in the open sea. This shows her to be not only the speediest United States battle ship afloat, but as fast as any ship of her class in any navy. When the Louisiana the other day easily exceeded her required speed, making 18.924 knots, the performance was hailed as a remarkable achievement, but the Virginia's record was never in serious danger, and it not likely to be exceeded by the Idaho, the last battle ship to be launched, whose speed requirement is only 17 knots.

In other respects, however, the Idaho, though smaller, will be more up to date ship than some of her consorts. She is even better equipped than the Mississippi, which was launched in September. Electricity is used aboard the Idaho to a greater extent than ever before attempted on a warship. Her water tight bulkhead doors of the "Long-Arm" system are closed by electricity from the pilot house, thus giving assurance that the ship will be rendered unshakable in case of emergency at sea.

For the machinery to be operated by electricity, the wires pass through indestructible steel tubes, with separate connections at every gun. The purpose of this equipment is to make it impossible for a foe to disable the machinery, as was the case in the naval battle between Russia and Japan, when the machinery of nearly every Russian ship was shot to pieces by the expert Japanese gunners.

The affairs of state should be conducted with a high sense of honor and on sound business principles and a broad plan of equality, and to that end there should be a watchful care and vigilance over every department. The high and the low, the rich and the poor, should receive the same courteous treatment.

The state school fund should be treated as sacred, and there should be no juggling with school lands. A law should be enacted preventing speculation in, or the sale or assignment of school land certificates.

All kinds of property, including franchises, should be required to pay a just and reasonable tax, and express and similar companies should pay a tax on their gross earnings in the state.

A law should provide for a state bank examiner, with conservative plenary power.

The primary law was enacted by a vote of a large majority of the people and is entitled to and should be given a fair trial and should be respected both as to its meaning and intent.

From sentiment and conviction, I stand with President Roosevelt on the labor question, and am in thorough accord with him on the question of railroad legislation.

I am a firm believer in, and an ardent supporter of, our public school system. I favor liberal support to, and a high standard of education; and with rare exceptions think our own boys and girls should be educated within the state of Oregon.

If successful in my administration the needs and wishes of the people will be the only "boss" and the only "machine," and there will be no "favorites" and nobody will have a "pull," and I will give the state an honest, clean, conscientious and vigilant administration, "of the people, by the people and for the people."

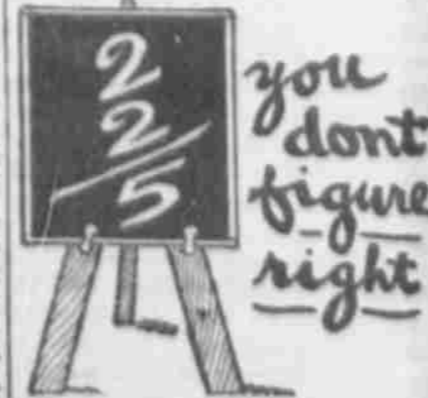

IRELAND TO HOLD A WORLD'S FAIR

Dublin, Jan. 12.—Ireland is to hold a world's fair in 1907. It will embody the results of the industrial revival which has swept over that island during the past decade.

Plans for the undertaking have been maturing for some years. There have been many obstacles to overcome, but the movement has been led by such indomitable men as James Shanks, ex-lord mayor of Dublin, and they determined at the start that they would not fail.

The main feature of the exposition will be the exhibition of home manufactures. Everything will be done, by the erection of suitable buildings and facilities for display, to make the Irish section a show worth going any distance to see.

The untraveled Irishman will have his first opportunity in many years to see the newest things of foreign manufacture. Furthermore, Ireland's greatest need just now is for markets for the wares which are the fruits of the industrial revival now in progress.

Incidentally, hundreds of thousands of visitors will be drawn to Ireland by the exhibition for the first time. It is expected, too, that this exposition will form a magnet which will draw thousands of Irish Americans back for a visit to their old homes.
