TICKET SHAPING UP WELL

Supreme Judge and Treasurer to go to Eastern Oregon

All indications point to a friendly contest for the Republican nomination, and all admit that a clean and able lot of men are being brought out, and that the ticket will be an unusually strong one. The direct primary emphasizes the ideas and principles more than the map, and the several platforms of the candidates are progressive and will go far to insure the success of the ticket.

There is a general custom of giving men in county and state governments who serve the people faithfully and who are honest and competent, a second term. The Republican party has seldom broken this custom, and when broken it has generally resulted in losses and demoralization of the ticket. Thus it is considered that State Printer Whitney, Attorney-General Crawford and State Superintendent Ackerman will be renominated. It is conceded that the supreme judgeship and state treasurer will be given to Eastern Oregon, as all the men who will be renominated are from Western Oregon, and Eastern Oregon has no candidate for secretary of state.

In Western Oregon the choice for the governorship lies between James Withycombe, of Corvallis, and T. T. Geer, of Salem. For secretary of state none of the Salem men have withdrawn nor seem likely to, and Mr. Benson, of Douglas county, added to the list. The latter is handicapped by having Attorney-General Crawford up for renomination without objection on the part of anyone, and it is not likely that two men on the state ticket will get there from the same county. Of course, the unexpected is likely to happen, and two strong and active candidates are possibilities even from the same town. Frank Wrightman, of Marion county, is making a hard fight for indirect taxation, circulating literature direct to the voters in a campaign of education for that principle. Portland politicians are bending their energies for the United States senatorship, and letting everything else go. The general opinion is current among Republicans that the campaign should be kept very good natured, and all determined to stand by the candidates who receive the popular support at the primary April 20th.

ALL FOUND GUILTY

After being out over four hours, the jury last night brought in a verdict of guilty against Panny Davenport, Agnes Smith, Leila Johnson and Lillie Thompson. These are four of the women who were arrested a few days ago by Marshal Cornelius on the charge of vagrancy and for living in houses of ill-fame. The trial began yesterday morning at 9:30, but no witnesses were called until after noon, and the case was not concluded until about 4:30.

According to the city ordinance, as interpreted by the recorder and the city attorney, all that the prosecution had to prove was that the defendants lived in a house or houses generally reputed to be houses of ill-fame. This was not hard to do, as all of the witnesses testified as to the general character of the houses, in which it was not disputed that the defendants lived. Their statements that the house was a house of ill-fame was not even disputed by the defense. Two of the witnesses called, Ross Cooper, of the Cooper saloon, and Alex. McCarthy, of the Elkhead saloon, admitted that they knew Panny Davenport, and where she lived, but that they did not know anything about the character of the house. The other witnesses for the prosecution were Cornelius, Lewis, Murphy and Gibson.

Fanni Davenport was the only witness called for the defense, and her testimony was given in an effort to show that she owned the property where she lived, and Cornelius had a personal grievance against her.

Great Activity in the Navy Yard.

Brooklyn, N. Y., Jan. 12.—The officers and employees of the Brooklyn navy yard are greatly interested in the decision in regard to the Olympia, the flagship of Rear-Admiral Bradford's squadron in the West Indies, and the Cleveland of the Des Moines, of the same squadron. These vessels were reported some time ago as greatly in need of repairs, and it seems likely that the Olympia will be placed out of commission on account of the extensive work required on her. In that event the Minneapolis will become the flagship of the third squadron of the North Atlantic fleet. It is a question, however, of more importance whether these vessels will be sent to the Norfolk navy yard, or to Brooklyn or to Boston. Rear-Admiral Bradford has recommended that the vessels proceed to New York for overhauling. Naval authorities in Washington, on the other hand, believe the ships should not go further north at this time than Norfolk. Of course, the ships of the third squadron have been in tropical waters many months with practically no liberty. The men are in such a physical state as is natural under the circumstances of the confinement of the tropics, and it is believed that if the vessels went to the Brooklyn yard the change in climate would be too great, and on the same theory the assignment of the ships to the Boston yard would be out of the question. Just now the destination of the ships is of great interest to the employees of the Brooklyn navy yard, for, with the completion of the Connecticut, and the inability to obtain necessary funds for the beginning of work on the collier which is to be built here, it will be necessary to let a number of employees go, unless some extensive repair work can be found for them.

Double Hanging in New Jersey.

Hackensack, N. J., Jan. 12.—The Hackensack jail was the scene of a double execution by hanging this morning. The delinquents were Mrs. Antoinetta Tolla, who shot and killed Joseph Sonta, her next door neighbor in Kingsland, where she lived, while she was talking to his son and Mr. Tolla at the latter's house, and Jerry Rosa, also an Italian, who was convicted of having shot and killed two other Italians at Lodi Heights. Both crimes had been committed several years ago and the murder trials, which were taken through several courts until they were finally decided adversely in the supreme court, were highly sensational and attracted considerable attention at the time.

Particularly the case of Mrs. Tolla was interesting, owing to the peculiar circumstances of the case. The Tollas and Sontas were next door neighbors and, apparently, on the very best of terms. It appears, however, that Sonta, who had a young son, and with him, frequently visited the Tollas, and dared to make love to Mrs. Tolla. What passed between Sonta and Mrs. Tolla immediately preceding the murder is not known and, probably, will never become known. On the day of the murder Mrs. Tolla was out visiting Mrs. Sonta, while Mr. Sonta and his son were at Tolla's house, talking to Mrs. Tolla's husband in the friendliest manner. When Mrs. Tolla returned from her visit she passed through the room in which the two men and the boy sat talking, went into her bedroom and, returning a moment later with a pistol, walked up close to Sonta and shot him while he was sitting in his chair. Various motives were assumed to explain the deed. One, which found more believers than all others, was that the woman, fearing the persistent attentions of Sonta and determined to protect the sanctity of her home at any cost, killed her too ardent admirer after an intimate talk with Sonta's wife.

The most determined efforts were made to save Mrs. Tolla from the gallows and the courts and the governor were flooded with appeals from all parts of the country. P. W. Stagg, the counsel for Mrs. Tolla, left no stone unturned to prevent the execution of his client, but neither his efforts nor the strong sentiment of the public against the execution of the woman, particularly since the gruesome exhibition at the hanging of the negro Tapley, could avert the condemned woman's fate. The board of pardons as well as the governor refused to interfere.

Rosa was convicted of having shot Demetrio Dineffio at Lodi, N. P., in February, 1904. Both delinquents being Roman Catholics, Father Lambert of Hackensack, aided them with spiritual advice and assisted them in the last hour of their life. Both died comparatively game, although the woman seemed scarcely sensible of what she was doing. The execution passed without a hitch and there seemed to be no prolonged agony. It is understood that Mrs. Tolla made a complete confession of her motives to Father Lambert.
