The Albany Argus makes a special attack on State Printer Whitney this week, and, if it can, have its way that gentleman will be retired to private life. He is besides not trying to dictate how the laws shall be amended regulating the affairs of that office. Criticism like the Albany Argus gets off may be doing some good, but will not in the long run hurt the character and standing of Mr. Whitney, or help those who want to get his place. Anonymous attacks seldom hurt the person they are aimed at so much as those directing that kind of warfare.
