GOOD BASKET BALL

In a fast, clean and interesting game of basket ball played at the Willamette university gymnasium Saturday the 'Varsity Coeds' defeated the high school girls by the score of 14 to 0. In spite of the fact that the score was decisive, the game was not nearly so one-sided as it would seem to indicate, for the maidens from the high school showed their older, larger and more experienced opponents that there were two sides to the contest.

Miss Richards, as coach of the high school team, deserves much credit for having, in so short a time, trained her girls to use good team work. Both sides used team work last night to a degree seldom seen in a girls' game, and that of the high school was almost, if not quite, the equal of the collegians. All they lacked was the skill in throwing baskets, when they had the opportunity, which fortunately or unfortunately has an important bearing on the result of the game.

A large crowd was present and all united in pronouncing it to be one of the best girls' games ever played in this city. Both sides played like veterans, and future matches will be looked forward to with much interest by the lovers of the sport in this city.

Willamette's victory Saturday night in the face of the fact that one week ago the high school girls held the O. A. C. team down to an 8 to 2 score, makes it seem possible that the Willamette girls will be able to regain in basket ball the laurels lost by the boys in football. The O. A. C. game will be played in Salem this year, although the date has not yet been decided, and when it comes off it is only a fair prediction to say that the gymnasium will be taxed to its utmost capacity.

Carrie Belknap at center and Ruby Coryell at forward were the star point winners for Willamette last night, although it must be said in fairness to the guards that the high school had nothing but a zero on its side of the score board. Few fouls were made on either side and only two points were scored on free throws from the foul line.
