## VOTERS REGISTER SLOWLY

Registration for the coming primaries is now going on, and the county clerk's office is kept busy entering the names of voters who call for registration. The time of one man is taken to make the entries as the voters come in a constant stream to the office, and as the lists come from outside precincts. The latter names have not begun to come in very fast as yet, but each day sees a larger number on the clerk's desk. A circular letter has been sent out by the county clerk asking that all registration blanks from outside precincts be sent into his office as rapidly as filled, thus keeping the registration right up to date, and making legal the signatures to any petitions that may be circulated for the different candidates, or on behalf of special bills.

A comparison of the registration as on the books on May 20, 1904, and October 20 of the same year, shows that the fall registration was 141 greater than that of the spring, and the present registration will probably be larger than any previous one.
