MAYOR APPOINTS COMMITTEES

Pays no Attention to Factional Lines in Making His Selections

Omitting all political prejudices, and having in mind only the best interests of the City of Salem, Mayor Waters last night, at the regular meeting of the city council, announced the appointment of committees for the current year. The appointments are as follows:

Ways and Means—Jacobs, Steusloff, Low.
Ordinances—Wallace, Baker, Downing.
Accounts and Current Expenses—Churchill, Wallace, Frazier.
Streets—Downing, Wallace, Frazier.
Public Buildings—Frazier, Low, Haas.
Sewerage—Skaife, Churchill, Goodale.
Plumbing—Haas, Jacobs, Bayne.
Licenses—Steusloff, Goodale, Bayne.
Fire and Water—Low, Churchill, Acheson.
Bridges—Gesner, Downing, Steusloff.
Health and Police—Baker, Acheson, Jacobs.
Lights—Acheson, Baker, Skaife.
Printing—Goodale, Gesner, Haas.
Public Parks—Bayne, Skaife, Gesner.

The matter of reconsidering the vote on the motion to expel the military boys was taken up, and was finally settled by allowing the company to retain the use of the hall until the first of March. In the meantime the committee on public buildings is to make an investigation and report as to the advisability of renting it for a further length of time.

Fred T. Merrill and a Mr. Simon, of Portland, presented an application for the use of the armory floor for a skating rink. Application was referred to the committee on public buildings.

The matter of putting up street signs at the street intersections, which has been coming up with much regularity for some time, was finally settled last evening, when a motion carried authorizing the mayor and city recorder to enter into a contract with W. B. Warner & Co., of this city, to furnish wooden signs 14x18 inches at 10 cents each to the extent of \$20 in each ward.

A resolution introduced by Alderman Downing, providing for the indexing and compiling of the city ordinances, and placing this work in the hands of the city attorney was adopted.

A motion to change the meeting night of the council from Tuesday to Monday aroused another debate, which was finally settled by referring the matter to a special committee which will investigate the rules of the council and report such amendments to them as the committee may deem expedient. The committee consists of Gesner, Downing and Wallace.

A petition was read from Wm. Butte and about 30 others asking for an are light at Twenty-fifth and Trade (or Simpson) street, and a similar petition from Joel Hewitt and 16 others for a light at the intersection of Statesman street and A street in High School addition. Both referred to committee on lights.

A petition for a bridge on Seventeenth between blocks seven and ten was read and referred to the committee on bridges.

On motion of Alderman Frazier, the council voted to expend \$150 each on Marion square and Wilson avenue, and on motion of Alderman Downing, the proposition of the fund for park purposes as set out in the budget was fixed at \$500 for Wilson avenue and \$300 for Marion square.

Mr. Wallace's motion to pay the city library \$50 for immediate needs was carried.

Acting on a recommendation from the fire chief, the committee on fire and water was authorized to purchase a necessary amount of coal for the department.

The report of Alderman Wallace to the effect that the east approach to the big steel bridge was in need of repairs was referred to the bridge committee with power to act.

Bids were opened for the construction of the bridge on South High street as follows:

McCoy & Moffitt 597.57

The bid of McCoy & Moffitt being the lowest, the mayor and recorder were instructed to enter into contract with this company for the construction of the bridge, and, upon motion of Gesner, the contractors were required to furnish a bond to protect the city from loss.

At the recommendation of the license committee a license was ordered issued

to Jack Cooper for his saloon on State street.

The favorable report of the light committee, on the petition for arc lights at intersection of Thirtieth and Waller streets, and Columbia and North Commercial streets was adopted.

Upon the recommendation of Fire Chief Savage the following men were elected as hosemen in his department: Wm. Iwan, Herbert Nuttner, Logan Hensley, Peter Graber, R. L. Southwick, J. L. George, A. G. Nace, W. G. Bebban, Andrew Campbell.

An ordinance was read changing the name of certain streets, as follows: Division in North Salem to Junction street.

Mill in North Salem to Belmont.
North in North Salem to Norway.
Oak in North Salem to Oakland.
North in F. S. Smith's addition to D. Ferry in Cook's addition to Fir.
Water in Depot addition to Waller.
Ash in Highland addition to Hickory.
Alder in Highland addition to Spruce.
Leslie in Brooklyn addition to Lee.
Leslie in Simpson addition to Lee.

This was referred to the ordinance committee.

An ordinance was introduced and referred to the committee on ordinances, providing for an amendment to the ordinance regulating the licensing of peddlers. It provides a license of \$55 per year, or in case of a person desiring to move away and to sell household goods a special fee of \$3 per day, such selling to take place on the premises of the party owning the goods to be sold.

The ordinance fixing the rate of assessment on property owners for the cost of the sewer in Cartwright's addition was passed, and the committee to which it had been referred recommended that the claims of certain parties for exemptions be not allowed.

Rival Companies Want to Build Road.

Buffalo, N. Y., Jan. 17.—The state railroad commissioners will meet here today to hear arguments in the matter of the applications for a certificate of necessity for a terminal by the Buffalo Lake Erie & Niagara railroad company. The company wants to run a belt line around Buffalo. The line covers practically the same territory as that traversed by the Buffalo Terminal railroad company, which has also applied for such a certificate. The two companies are composed of rival businessmen and the commissioners will have considerable difficulty in solving the problem before them. The frontier company was denied a certificate last year and the present application is practically a renewal of the former application. The railroad commissioners will have to decide on the strength of the testimony and arguments offered, which one of the two rival companies, if any, is entitled to a certificate. It is safe to say that, no matter what the decision of the railroad commissioners may be, the company ruled out will appeal to the courts to have the decision of the commission set aside. The result may be that the line will not be built for several years.

Pioneer Woman Dies.

Mrs. Matilda Stanton, one of the faithful old pioneer women of this state, died at Stayton Sunday, January 14, 1906, aged nearly 90 years. She was born March 13, 1816, in Tennessee. She moved to Missouri quite young, and settled in Clay county, marrying Benjamin Stanton March 13, 1835. In 1853 she removed with her husband to Oregon, settling in the Waldo Hills. For many years she has resided at Stayton with her daughters. She leaves seven children and many grandchildren. Of her own offspring, the following are alive: J. E. Stanton, Salem; Mrs. Mary Isenhart and Mrs. Elizabeth Gist, Stayton; Mrs. Matilda Cooley, Cheate valley, Curry county; Mrs. Dora Bruer, Waldo Hills; Mrs. Nancy Cornish, Sublimity; Mrs. Alice Small, Silverton. The remains of the departed were buried with a large attendance of friends and relatives at the Maclean cemetery Tuesday afternoon. She had been a member of the Baptist and Christian churches all her life, and Rev. Morton delivered a very impressive funeral sermon. Mrs. Stanton was one of the grand old mothers in Israel devoted to her family and kind and patient under all tribulation. Her reward is in the consciousness that she is at peace with her God and the Savior of all humanity.

Cleaning Up the City.

Chicago, Jan. 17.—The owners of the dives which cluster around the lower part of the downtown business district have been notified by the chief of police that they will not be tolerated in that locality after May 1, 1906. This announcement at first caused considerable consternation and surprise among the owners, who are mostly ward politicians of considerable pull and have heretofore enjoyed immunity, if not actual protection from the Democratic administration. After awhile they began to doubt the sincerity of the police department and came to the conclusion that the order was merely like so many other previous orders, a scheme to throw sand into the eyes of the public, which has become thoroughly disgusted with the lawless condition of certain disreputable streets close to the business district. The mayor received information that the dive owners did seem to fear any serious interference and were making no preparations to move from the forbidden district. Thereupon he sent word to them through the police department that the order issued was peremptory and meant exactly what it said. Since then there has been considerable activity among the politicians of the wards in which these dives are located and several efforts have been made to induce the mayor to rescind the order or, at least, to extend the time. Mayor Dunne has declined, however, to rescind or in any way change the order.

A New Perce Ghost.

A despatch to the Tacoma Ledger from Not Perce, Idaho, dated Jan. 14, says: At intervals for two months old men report seeing a ghost during all hours of the night—a woman ghost, dressed in long black flowing gowns with a white or black scarf tied closely over the head until her face is almost invisible.

When C. W. Felt, a merchant, brought in the report two months ago that a mysterious woman had been hanging around his house he was ridiculed. But now sentiment has changed. Dozens of people have seen the apparition, but no one has had courage to ask her business. Children keep close indoors at night. In fact, the ghost has the whole town "buffaloed."

The phantom has promenade all over the town, and made its headquarters near the house where John Muir hung himself on January 1, 1905. Muir's body was not found for five months.
