HONOR THE KITE FLYER

Boston, Mass., Jan. 17.—Throughout
the United States the two hundredth
anniversary of the birth of Benjamin
Franklin is celebrated today. Patri-
otic societies everywhere have arrang-
ed for special celebrations and there
is probably not a school in the coun-
try, from Maine to California, from the
Canadian frontier to the Gulf, where
the memory of the great American is
not appropriately honored. Boston, be-
ing the birthplace of Franklin, made
special efforts to pay a fitting tribute
to the memory of the great scientist,
statesman and philosopher.

In co-operation with the Franklin bi-
centennial committee of the common-
wealth and the city of Boston the pro-
gram for the celebration was arranged.
Particular attention was given to the
appropriate celebration of the day in
the public schools of the city. A pam-
phlet, containing a brief autobiography
of Franklin and extracts from his
writings, was compiled and distribut-
ed among the different schools, to be
used by the teachers at the exercises
in honor of Franklin. Special celebra-
tions were arranged in every school in
the city and a general celebration will
be held this afternoon at Symphony
hall. It will have a public character
and the public will be admitted free to
all seats on the ground floor and in the
gallery, which are not used by the pub-
lic school children. The exercises will
include addresses and a musical pro-
gram, rendered by a chorus of 160 mix-
ed voices from the schools, and the
English high school orchestra of forty
pieces. A poem, specially written for
the occasion by the Hon. James Jeff-
rey Roche, the American consul in
Genoa, Italy, will be one of the fea-
tures of the celebration.

Philadelphia, Penn., Jan. 17.—Next
to Boston, Philadelphia has probably
a greater claim to Benjamin Franklin
than any other city in the United
States. For that reason the city has
made special preparations for the ob-
servance of the two hundredth anni-
versary of the birth of the great Amer-
ican. The largest special celebration
has been arranged by the American
Philosophical society, which Benjamin
Franklin founded in this city and
which is still in existence. The state
legislature appropriated \$20,000 for
the purpose, which amount was placed
at the disposal of the Philosophical so-
ciety to defray the cost of the cele-
bration. The celebration will take the
form of a meeting at which the United
States government, the government of
the state of Pennsylvania, the munici-
pal government and representatives of
various states of the union will be
present. The French government will
be also represented. Governor Penn-
sylvania will preside at the meeting and
a number of distinguished orators will
speak on Benjamin Franklin and his
remarkable career.

Besides that celebration there will
be special celebrations in all the pub-
lic schools and high schools of the city.
Interesting programs with music, sing-
ing and addresses have been prepared.
President Roosevelt had been invited
to attend the celebration of the Amer-
ican Philosophical society, but was un-
able to come owing to the pressure of
public business.

New York, Jan. 17.—The memory of
Benjamin Franklin was honored in this
city today by special celebrations of
the two hundredth anniversary of his
birth in all the public schools and high
schools of the city. Several patriotic
societies will have memorial meetings
and anniversary celebrations in honor
of Franklin this evening.

Chicago, Ill., Jan. 17.—All Chicago
honors the memory of Benjamin Frank-
lin today. By order of the school
board the two hundredth anniversary
of Benjamin Franklin is appropriately
observed in all the public schools by
special celebrations with music, sing-
ing, recitations and addresses on the
subject of Franklin and the history of
his brilliant career. The Old Time
Printers' Association of Chicago will
hold a meeting this evening, when a
number of addresses in honor of Frank-
lin will be delivered by distinguished
orators.

The management of the electrical ex-
hibition at the Coliseum has designat-
ed today as Franklin day and has ar-
