VALUE OF LAWSON'S ADVICE

It began in December, 1904, and disclosed a nervous bull account in Amalgamated Copper. Mr. Lawson announced that, contrary to rumors, he was not long on copper to any dangerous extent, and that, consequently, he had not been obliged to unload. The first big advertisement appeared on December 6, when Amalgamated Copper had been selling between 32 and 33. He reviewed the history of the stock, showing how it had advanced to 130 in 1901; at this highest price, he stated, he was buying the stock and advising its purchase; then came the awful slump, which slid it down to 33; he still advised his friends to buy, and as a result 200,000 shares were bought by people all over the country through him, and perhaps hundreds of thousands more shares through sources he could not trace, all at an average price of 40 to 42; he continued, he said, to bull the market, until, as he claimed, the public had possession of 1,000,000 shares. This advertisement made no predictions, but simply advised everybody who held Amalgamated Copper stock to sell out pell mell. In the next one, however, he declared the stock would sell at 33, and during the week there was a heavy decline, the stock at one time falling as low as 33 1/2. Mr. Lawson resumed his campaign on the following Monday by frantically advising all to sell "before it is too late," and he solemnly asserted that the only reason why the market had not entirely gone to pieces was because he sold enormous amounts presumably to steady prices, until his friends got from under.—New York Times.

RICHEST OF THE NATIONS

Let us see how much actual cash there is in the pocket books of various nations and understand, by comparison, how rich we really are. The total stock of money, in gold, silver and uncovered paper, in the whole world amounts, in round figures, to \$12,000,000,000. In the United States the total stock of money amounts to about \$2,000,000,000. Hence, we have in our own purse one-sixth of all the cash of the globe. The figures—and this is a part which must be emphasized—do not represent the wealth of nations. Far from it. These figures represent merely the available hard cash. Divide this hard cash of the earth among the inhabitants thereof, and each man, woman and child would have \$10. But divide the hard cash of the United States among the people thereof and each one of us would have \$25. And here is one respect in which the people of a foreign country would have the better of us, individually. Were each nation to divide its cash among its own people, each living human being in France would have \$35, or \$10 more than each person in our country under similar circumstances. Meantime, the divided cash of Great Britain would give each Briton only \$18; in Germany the cash per capita would amount to only \$17; Russia \$8, and Japan \$3, while in Cuba each person would get only a \$2 bill.

Of the world's \$12,000,000,000 in cash \$2,000,000,000 are right here in the United States. And one-twenty-fifth of all the cash in gold in the world is stored in New York alone. This gold, this symbol and synonym for wealth, comes, like all things else, from the ground, from mines. Here, again, we lead all nations, for we ourselves produce one-third of all the gold of the earth, as we produce one-third of all the silver. Our chief contributors to this product are the mines of Colorado, South Dakota, California, Mexico and Alaska. Consider merely Cripple Creek! As under a magician's wand that region has in fourteen years developed until it now covers at least 130 square miles, with many cities and towns connected one with another by rail. Here is an earnest, sober population engaged in the business of extracting precious metals from the mountains to the tune, some years, of \$25,000,000. So much for the work of man in securing the raw material for money.—Wilson Willets in Leslie's Weekly.

Japs Going to South America.

Consul Brittain, of Kohl, Germany, reports that according to a recent article in a German newspaper the Japanese government has recently granted a subsidy to a Japanese-South American steamship line, which plies between Japan and Buenos Ayres, Argentina. The object of this is to increase the imports of wool, flour and wheat from Argentina, which products are chiefly needed and desired for Japan's army and marines. An English newspaper also reports on a similar matter, and remarks: "The scheme, which has been under consideration for some time, for the immigration of Japanese workmen to Brazil and the creation for that purpose of a direct Japanese steamship service to Santos and Rio Janeiro is about to be realized. Two special commissioners of the Japanese government are now examining, on the spot, the proposal of establishing a Japanese bank at Rio Janeiro." The same English newspaper also reports that

"a syndicate of several banks and commercial firms in Bremen has, in connection with the shipping firm Horn of Schleswig and Lubeck formed a new steamship company under the name of the Roland Line, to carry on a direct service between Bremen and the west coast of South America. The formal constitution of the new company will take place in the course of a month."
