THE MOROCCAN CONFERENCE.

The Position of the United States as a Party to It.

The conference for the settlement and regulation of the affairs of Morocco has assembled and is composed of representatives of eleven European powers and the United States. It is, we believe, a new thing for the United States to take part in a conference of European powers in respect to a subject which is really European, although the scene of the controversy is in northwestern Africa. There are two phases of the controversy, one strictly commercial upon the supposition that the empire of Morocco is to remain intact and develop itself on its own racial and national lines. In this respect the United States is interested, as it is interested in China, that opportunities for trade shall remain open to us as freely as to the people of any other nation. The other phase is political and involves the underlying suspicion that the independence of the empire and the integrity of its territory may not be permanent. In such a case France, as the next neighbor of Morocco in Africa, claims a paramount influence, which its statesmen illustrate by reference to the attitude of the United States toward the Spanish-American powers.

The two cases, however, are not parallel. The Monroe doctrine was enunciated with no thought of control of southern republics by this country, and certainly with no thought of getting any of their territory, although, of course, we have as a matter of fact, acquired a very great area. The nation, however, does not desire any more and is sincerely anxious that all these republics shall work out their own destinies undisturbed. France, however, has recently adopted the policy of colonial expansion. Its African possessions adjoin Morocco, and the boundary is uncertain. The nomadic tribes which inhabit the border land have an evil reputation, and it is well understood that France desires a free hand with them, even to the extent of establishing a protectorate if deemed necessary, which would mean ultimate absorption. To this paramount influence with its possible consequences Western Europe seems ready to assent, but Germany protests in a way which indicates that she would go to war to prevent, if assured that France would get nothing but moral support from England, Italy and Spain. With that political phase of the question the United States can have nothing to do, unless willing to concede Europe an equivalent voice in the settlement of similar questions on this continent. It is right enough to take measures to protect our trade with Morocco, should, however, the result of the conference involve international policing of the empire, as opposed to French policing, it is not likely that the President intends or that congress would consent that the United States shall take part in it.—S. P. Chronicle.
