Commercial Club Asks That Portland Open Up Streets

The Commercial Club of Eugene held a large meeting last night, and resolutions were adopted asking that Portland grant the franchise asked by the Willamette Valley Electric railroad. Addresses were made by Fred Mulkey, of Portland, and E. Hofer, of Salem, and a strong delegation will be sent to the Albany Development Convention to back the resolution.

Eugene expects to send a carload of delegates to the Albany convention, and the convention promises to surpass any yet held, in point of attendance.

BIRDS AND THE FARMER

Opinion among farmers, says the Daily Mail, is hopelessly divided as to the value of birds to the agriculturist.

At a discussion held by the board of agriculture some advocated the destruction of what they regarded as feathered pests, others claimed that the birds do more good than harm. Those most interested in the subject think that under present conditions the balance of nature has been upset.

The gamekeepers killed off the predatory birds, and farmers' clubs give a high price for magpies, jays and others that prey on eggs and fledglings. The result is that there is unquestionably an abnormal number of small birds that do a great amount of damage to crops.

The Society for the Protection of Wild Birds agrees that with some exceptions the number of their proteges is increasing, but it is pointed out that while the damage the birds do is palpable the good they do is not so easily noted.

A long series of mild winters has preserved the birds, especially the soft billed kinds, who feed so largely on fruit. It is of these that so many complaints are now being made by fruit growers in Surrey and Kent.

Decimus Lingwood of Stonham, Suffolk, writes: "I consider the increasing fondness of birds for fruit is in a great measure due to the dry summers. Worms, etc., being difficult to obtain, the birds turned their attention to fruit, not only eating it themselves but bringing up their young on the same diet. By the wild birds protection acts orders are granted by the home secretary to county councils applying the acts to each county. The shooting or snaring of wild birds is prohibited from March 1 to August 1, except in the case of certain districts where a variation has been secured, usually for the protection at all times of all birds. The prohibition, except in the latter cases, does not apply to the owners or occupiers of land or persons authorized by them, so that farmers have a great deal of latitude in the matter."

The Wild Birds' Protection society points out the fact that there is no bird fairly chargeable with any appreciable damage which the owner or tiller of the soil is prevented sloughing at any period of the year. It is claimed that the division of birds into insectivorous and otherwise is misleading. Few species are either entirely insectivorous or entirely vegetarian. And both hard billed and soft billed birds include men's allies in the cultivation of the ground.

POISONED WHOLE FAMILY

Ex-Governor Peabody, of Colorado, Threatened With Death

Denver, Jan. 19.—A News special from Canyon City received last night, says that ex-Governor James H. Peabody, his wife and their daughter were poisoned by food eaten at breakfast this morning, and that the daughter, Miss Cora Peabody, is in a dangerous condition.

The governor and Mrs. Peabody, although quite ill for several hours, recovered sufficiently to devote their attention to their daughter. Physicians are in attendance upon the young lady, and, unless a change for the worse comes tonight, they believe she will escape serious consequences.

Mystery surrounds the affair. Enough was gleaned from the friends of the family tonight to show that there is a belief that an attempt was made to destroy the family by poison. An intimate friend of the Peabodys said that several letters had been received by the ex-governor within the past week or two, calling his attention to the manner of death of ex-Governor Steunenberg, of Idaho, and threatening him with a similar fate.

A special to the Indianapolis News from Marion, Ind., says that after a hard fight of seventeen years against competitors who advertised, Gunder Bros., dry goods merchants, the oldest mercantile firm in Marion and at one time the largest retail house in northern Indiana, have given up the hopeless struggle and sold out their business.

When gas was discovered in Marion the town began to grow rapidly, and competition in all business was soon encountered by all the old local merchants. The new merchants advertised, but many of the old established firms were slow in believing that it was necessary for them to use printers' ink, as they knew nearly every man in the county. All of them who are now in business concluded that it was necessary to advertise in order to hold what trade they had and to increase it, except Gunder Bros., who absolutely refused, claiming it was money thrown away. The firm had the best business site in the city, but the store was never filled with shoppers. Thousands passed and repassed the place day after day without stopping. The firm carried an excellent line of goods and treated customers well, but only a few farmers and some of the old citizens of Marion patronized the place. The store is now closed for business.
