The following graphic description of the Philippine Islands is from the Mount Pleasant, Mich., Enterprise, the editor of which paper spent some time in the islands:

I have been in the Philippine Islands about three months (too many), and as I see them they are a bunch of trouble on the horizon of civilization. They are bounded on the north by rocks and destruction, on the east by typhoons and hurricanes, on the south by cannibals and earthquakes, on the west by sharks and smugglers.

The interior of the islands are composed of mud and mountains. The population includes 80,000 carabao (water buffaloes) and 8,000,000 rooters. Of the people, 80,000 are in-surrectos, 80,000 are amigos (friends at the muzzle of a .44) and the balance are Chinese gamblers and carabao drivers.

The Philippine Islands are a nice bouquet for a deadly enemy. The climate is pleasant and healthy for most

quitters, ants, lizards, bats, scorpions, snakes and carabao.

Malaria fever is so prevalent that on many occasions the islands have shaken by the vibration of the inhabitants in their chills.

To let you know the varieties of diseases the men of the army, navy, and marine corps have to contend with with slum and beans for "chow," I will name some of the simpler, such as beri beri, smallpox, leprosy, cholera, bubonic plague, cholera, all of which are guaranteed to give satisfaction.

The natives are very industrious, their chief occupations being cock-fighting and stealing. Their marriage ceremony is very impressive, especially that clause in the contract which provides for the wife the privilege of laboring for her husband as much as he desires. The home dress of the Filipina is attractive and artistic, consisting of transparent and primitive outlines. The native costume is floor mats tied around the body (Harris Brothers' brands being preferred);

OREGON ROOTERS ARE BUSY

Carried the Rain With Them and Both Were More Than Welcome

Oregon's delegation is certainly having a good time in California and is also creating a good impression. Wednesday's Chronicle speaks of their visit as follows:

The white and gold room of the St. Francis hotel was a beautiful picture during the reception which the Oregon Development league gave to the merchants of San Francisco in the evening. Across one end of the room was a long table laden with refreshments and bowls of sparkling liquid, with many waiters to attend the wants of the guests. In the center of the room was the platform reserved for the speakers of the evening, draped in red and gold.

Fully 400 people were present at one time or another during the evening, including most of the prominent merchants of San Francisco and a large number of handsomely gowned women. As the guests came into the room they were met at the head of the receiving line by Judge Henry M. Calk, who presented each one to Governor Chamberlain. They passed in turn to Mayor Schmitz and Mrs. Schmitz, H. L. Pittock, James D. Phelan, Mrs. H. L. Pittock, Franklin K. Lane and Mrs. Lane, and A. N. Moores and Mrs. Moores. After passing the line they assembled in groups around the room until called to order by Tom Richardson, who acted as chairman for the evening.

In a short speech Mr. Richardson told of the mission of the visitors and what they hoped to accomplish in this and other cities of the state after which he introduced Governor Chamberlain. The Oregon executive was especially happy in his remarks concerning the state of fraternalism existing between the two states, and recommended that they meet together as often as possible in order to accomplish the greatest results.

Following Governor Chamberlain the chairman read telegrams from Governor Pardee and others regretting their inability to be present, and sending their wishes for the success of the movement. He then introduced Mayor Schmitz, who told of the work to be done by the Pacific coast and the part California and Oregon might play in it. His address was brief, but expressed the feeling of good fellowship which exists between the two communities.

Franklin K. Lane, James D. Phelan, and Judge Calk then made short addresses, the latter speaking strongly in favor of the admission of the Chinese along the coast, and giving a comprehensive idea of what exclusion means to this section of the country and to the whole United States. David Starr Jordan, the last speaker on the list, also dwelt upon the benefits to be derived from a restricted admission of Chinese, and cited numerous examples within his knowledge.

The spirit of the entire evening was one of interstate fraternity, and the Oregonians plainly showed their desire to be more than mere neighbors and to cooperate with California in exploiting the wonderful resources and facilities of the Pacific coast. They also showed themselves to be capital entertainers and leave many friends in San Francisco when they depart this morning.

At 9 o'clock they leave for Palo Alto, where they will stay until noon, going from there to San Jose, Del Monte, Paso Robles, Santa Barbara and Los Angeles. There the party will disband and return to Portland as they may desire.

The California Promotion committee was represented at the reception by Andrea Shuboro, Rufus P. Jennings, George W. McNear, Fred J. Koster, S. F. Booth, David Starr Jordan, president of Leland Stanford Jr. university; President Benjamin H. Wheeler, Lewis E. Aubrey, California State Mining bureau, and Colvin B. Brown, representing the San Joaquin valley counties; W. A. Beard and Marshall Diggs, representing the Sacramento valley counties, and Edwin Stearns, representing San Francisco bay counties.

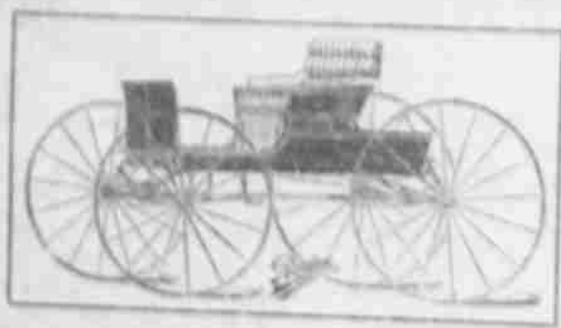
