## FIGHT FOR INDIRECT TAXATION

This battle must go forward. It was started by the reports of the Willamette Valley Development League.

The grange bills are on the right line, and the bills of the Farmers' and Shippers' Congress **SHOULD HAVE UNANIMOUS SUPPORT.**

Like the flat salary law, which was fought for four years, indirect taxation can be pushed by any public-spirited citizen.

There is still one week left to get signatures to the petition, and all who have not done so should circulate and sign the bill.

Not one dollar has been paid to get signatures to this bill. It was gotten up and publicly submitted to a large convention.

It is a voluntary effort of public-spirited citizens to **BETTER CONDITIONS AND HASTEN DEVELOPMENT OF OREGON.**

If there are not petitions enough the principles of the bill will be put up to the legislature. All its important features have passed the lower house once or twice and been killed in the state senate.

## AN IMPORTANT SESSION.

All who know current history in Oregon realize that the next general assembly is the most important that ever happened, or is likely to happen.

The general appropriation bill of the last session **WILL BE KILLED BY THE DIRECT VOTE OF THE PEOPLE ON REFERENDUM.**

The next legislature will have to appropriate the money over again.

In addition the appropriation for the next two years will have to be made, and is all nearly four million dollars will have to be appropriated, and **AS MUCH MORE AS THEY HAVE A MIND TO TAKE.**

The normal school question will have to be fought out, and two United States senators ratified by the legislators. In this latter contingency there is liable to be a deadlock or a holdup, or the Lord knows what.

Why about 20 gentlemen in this country should want to assume the vast responsibilities that such a session will force upon them is beyond the comprehension of the ordinary mortal.

For \$120 the work of securing a nomination, an election, and then taking the chances of failure to satisfy the people, looks like **BUYING A WHITE ELEPHANT TO WINTER IN THE ARCTIC REGIONS.**

Seriously speaking men of the best business ability, of the firmest character and the greatest experience and political acumen will not be apt to be any too well equipped for the duties they will encounter.

## SALEM SHOULD HAVE AN AMBASSY.

The city of Salem supports one of the best companies of the Oregon National Guard in the state and should support a first-class army.

There are several plans on which it could be built, and these plans should be taken up and acted upon by the city and county if possible.

There is no doubt that the city hall is being racked by the drifting of the company on the third floor of that building.

The pride of this city is in its military company, and there should be nothing done to discourage the young men composing it.

The people of Woodburn are ready to construct a fine armory, and we should be second to any town in the county in respect.

## A WORD TO THE WISE.

Hiring two pages of the Newberg Graphic and circulating thousands of copies attacking Walter L. Touse is poor business for any Republican to engage in. The three agents for the Republican nomination for congress should be friends. To the credit of Mr. Touse he has not engaged in any attack on his competitors. It would be far more gentlemanly if all would uniformly speak well of each other, so that whatever is nominated the other may equally help elect him, and share in the glory and success and divide the honors of leadership of the party. All three are men of more than average ability and would command respect in any gathering of representative men. The knifing and slashing should be left to the other party, who will do enough of it to keep all Republicans busy during the coming election campaign. The Republican party is not any too strong in this state and tactics of warfare within the party

should be discouraged. We do not blame Touse for replying to the Hawley managers in this city who attacked him.

## BETTER PAID POSTAL SERVICE.

There is much fault found with the postal service in Oregon but few persons are aware that, considering the responsibility, there are few public servants so poorly paid as postal employees.

We meet in our daily duties, people of many and various vocations and but very few of those we meet are there whose annual income is less than \$900 per year and when we do see such persons, they are invariably those who are not holding responsible positions.

We realize the important position which is filled by all United States postal clerks.

The government demands for such positions men of good address, polite and attractive to their duties, neat in appearance and above all other requirements, they must be trustworthy. The only inviting or desirable feature connected with such occupation is the fact that party politics does not affect the civil service employee and that he may be sure of employment so long as he proves faithful and capable to perform his duties.

The post office department is paying \$600 per year at the beginning for such service, with no inducement for the clerk by an increased salary, except by order of special legislation.

Three years ago congress provided for an increase of \$100 per year for clerks of certain classification, but a late ruling made this apply only to that particular year.

Unless some provision is made by congress for a reasonable increase in salaries of those postal clerks who have proven by time to be competent and worthy, many of the best and most efficient employees of the post office department will change their vocation, thereby making it impossible for the office to render the prompt and accurate service which is so desirable to all business interests.

Just consider for a moment, would you expect an able bodied young man to enter the civil service if the limit of his remuneration was fixed at \$600 per year? If honest and married it would be next to impossible for him to live.

We should request congress to enact a law regulating and classifying the salaries of postal clerks of all first and second class offices, granting an increase in the salaries of all who have been employed more than one year prior to the enactment of such a law.
