After announcing a meeting of the Business Men's League of the valley towns at 6:30 at the city council rooms, the program was resumed. P. F. Sears, of Silverton made a very pleasing talk on the advantages of that bright town of the Willamette valley.

velopment League work, unite it with the Grangers, and other organizations was the dream that the professor hoped to see realized.

President H. M. Crooks, of Albany college, captured the audience from the start by some pleasant references to Oregon matters by a man who four years ago came to Oregon. We were united in all but as to our toes. High schools, normal schools, colleges and universities were all higher education.

The evening session was held at the Albany opera house, and it was crowded to the doors. A great deal of fun was caused by the presiding officer inviting all the candidates for office to take seats on the platform.

One of the first things done in the evening was to telegraph resolutions to the Portland city council, asking that they pass the Willamette valley electric railway franchise.

Wallis Nash told the old, old story of the opening of Yaquina bay, the survey and construction of the Corvallis & Eastern railway, twenty years ahead of its time, and the present irrigated fields and white homes of settlers in the Garden of the Lord, as he called Eastern Oregon.

The greatest obstacle was "his inertia"—the resistant power of standing still—that was the curse of any country. Mr. Nash spoke from the heart, and was loudly applauded as one of the pioneer heroes of development, when there was little or nothing to build upon in this country, compared to what was here now.

Frank J. Miller talked of progress in a practical manner. The farm and factory were closely allied—both being carried on by wage-earning classes.

Mayor Grimes, of McMinnville, discussed the common everyday things of life, illustrating by near late the emptiness. He is a progressive, efficient and practical, and president of the Oregon Fire Relief Association. The quartet sang some more, was recalled again and again. The evening program closed with a reception at the city club.

ALL ON GOOD PLATFORMS

Thanks to the aggressive declaration of the Woodburn candidate all aspirants for congress in this district are on progressive people's platforms.

The Tonne platform is the most aggressive and the most forceful and has a ring to it that is unmistakable. The other candidates elaborate more while he takes a shot at the bullseye and hits it almost every time.

HE SHOULD RESIGN. A very unusual state of affairs exists at present in the matter of the Salem justice of the peace district. The

young man who holds the position has completely disqualified himself for the same by his acts in the recent land trials. The confessions made by him which were utilized to save his freedom and by which another man was deprived of his, certainly unfit the occupant of the seat of justice in this district for the place he holds.

The Journal once before advised him to resign and withdraw from his position. This would enable him to engage in some occupation where he could make an honorable living, but this advice has not been heeded. Litigants of this district are still obliged to have their cases tried before this young man, who, by his own confession, is totally unfit for the trust he holds. If he does not resign he will bring upon himself and the office supreme contempt, the results of which cannot be estimated. He should resign at once, and give back to the people the trust which he has dishonored.
