PROBLEM IN INFANT FEEDING

Thomas S. Southworth says that an important problem in infant feeding has been the question of how milk whose composition and properties remain practically the same throughout lactation can be equally suitable for a digestion that is at birth feeble and at weaning able to care for adult foods. The explanation is that milk itself is directly instrumental in developing the digestive tract, through the changes in consistency of the curd caused by the alterations in the composition of the developing gastric juice. The infant's first semi-solid food is produced by the action of rennet alone, then hydrochloric acid and pepsin are secreted in larger and larger amounts, the effect of the acid being to cause more and more solid, while the pepsin is provided to digest them. In this way the amount of work for the stomach keeps pace with gastric digestion. The most suitable foreign milk to use for infant feeding is that of the cow, but the measures adopted to secure the digestion by the infant of a sufficient amount of the casein of cow's milk to maintain the tissues and promote growth will have to be decided by the physician for each individual infant, and the art of infant feeding as distinguished from the science of infant feeding, is principally wrapped up in this one point. It is for the physician to determine; whether he will make such addition to the milk that it will remain in a semi-fluid state; whether by the freer use of some alkaline antacid, like bicarbonate of sodium, he will completely neutralize the acid of the stomach and throw the digestion of the food into the intestine; whether he will use a gruel diluent to mechanically separate the milk curd; whether he will combine several of these measures, or whether, perchance, in cases of particularly difficult case in digestion, he will stop milk entirely and temporarily feed some substance which will not form a solid in the stomach.—Medical Record.

X-RAYS

Animals That Really Worked.

"We are all sprung from phlox." said a nature student. "Why should it be strange then to discover that animals, no less than ourselves have industries and trades?"

"There are, for instance, birds that sew. The tailor birds not only sew they make their own bread too. Upon their beaks they weave into thread, spider web and bits of wool and cotton. Then the male pierces with his bill two rows of holes in the big, tough leaf that has been chosen for a nest. He stands on one side of this leaf, his mate on the other, and as one pushes the thread into the hole the other pulls it through. The leaf is sewed into the form of a bag, and that is the tailor bird's nest."

"The sponge crab is also a tailor. It makes for itself a coat out of sponge. A Frenchman, M. d'Hercules, removed the sponge from one of these crabs, substituting a piece of white cloth. The crab took to the cloth kindly. It made forthwith a crude white overcoat with four sleeves for its claws and chief flappers."

"There are fish that are hunters. They kill flies by shooting at them with great force a globule of water."

"There are farming ants—they raise mushrooms and rice. There are hotel-keeping muscels—they have in their shells a small compartment that is always occupied by a pea-crab. There are candle-making birds—to keep off snakes; the ystick every night a dozen fireflies in a lump of soft clay in front of their nests."—Philadelphia Bulletin.
