FOURTEEN BURIED IN A MINE

(Four O'Clock Edition.)

Port Smith, Ark., Jan. 25.—Fourteen miners were suffocated and entombed by an explosion in Whitteville mine No. 6, three miles west of here last night. Sixteen were in the entry at the time of the explosion, but two escaped. Thirty-two were in another section, but they fled, uninjured. A rescue party was formed immediately, but the entrance was so hot the men could not enter. The superintendent spurred the men on by saying there was air sufficient to preserve the men's lives a short time. Heroic efforts were made in the heat, dust and gas, but they could not reach the victims in time. The bodies were recovered today.

Canadian, on his way home at the time of the accident. But one body was ever recovered, and that was of a woman named Fannie Palmer, whose corpse washed ashore on San Juan Island, which, by the way, was her home. It was identified by the finger rings. Captain Bockwell, the famous horseman, with his family and his fine collection of trained horses, including the celebrated "Mazeppa," were all lost in this wreck, as was a small circus company and a theatrical company, that but a short time before had played "The Picket Guard" here.

Barney Pompelly, now of Salem, and a man named Cole, were with Rockwell, taking care of his horses, but by accident missed the boat at Victoria, and hence saved their lives.

More May Be Saved.

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 25.—At the local offices of the Pacific Coast Steamship Company the statement is given out that information has been received from the wreck to the effect that a life raft and life boat yet unaccounted for had gotten away safely from the Valencia. On one raft were eight women. It is said, while no one knows how many more are in the life boat. The raft which is said to contain the women may be the one picked up by the steamer Texan, as reported in the earlier dispatches.

A \$45,000,000 Diamond.

According to a reliable authority the number and total value of diamonds produced last year was not so large as the year before. No important discoveries of new mines were made, but 1905 will be ever memorable because on January 26 of that year Fred Wells, manager of the Premier mine in the Transvaal colony, South Africa, while going his rounds, picked up the largest diamond ever seen or heard of in all history. It exceeds in size and weight and purity all of the fabulous diamonds we have read of. No writer of fiction has ever dared to imagine so large or so valuable a diamond as Mr. Wells actually picked up from the dump that afternoon. Estimated by the ordinary price per carat, its value is not less than nine million pounds. It weighs 3,024 carats, or 1.37 pounds avoirdupois, and its dimensions are four by two and a half by one and a half inches. It is extremely pure, clear and water-white, and Dr. Moissan, the government geologist of the Transvaal, describes it as "resembling a piece of ice." The owners are puzzled to decide what to do with it. Of course nobody is rich enough to buy a \$45,000,000 diamond, and the company cannot afford to allow that enormous amount of capital to lie idle. The

company, it is reported, has offered to sell the stone for \$2,500,000 to the British government upon the condition that it shall never be cut and shall be placed in the crown or exhibited in a museum for the edification of the public in its original form.

William Boyd of the Curtis Publishing company addressed the Manufacturers' Advertising club at the Hotel Euclid, says the Cleveland (O.) Plain Dealer, on "The Preparations Necessary to a Successful Advertising Campaign." Mr. Boyd opened with the statement that unless a business organization is responsive to changing trade conditions it cannot be successful. He cited the growth of advertising to show it one of the new business conditions which every concern must meet.

Trade advertisements are a waste of money, according to Mr. Boyd, and he likened the trial advertiser to the tradesman who sends out traveling salesmen and then discharges them, expecting that results from the single effort will warrant engagement of other salesmen for a like single trip.

Mr. Boyd likened advertising to a business insurance. If an advertiser's place of business burns down, even though he has no fire insurance, he can at once rebuild and continue to do a profitable business because he has advertised, thereby creating a demand for his goods.
