MUST RUSTLE NAMES

Although local politics are very quiet just at present there is no doubt but in the ten weeks that yet remain during which candidates can file their nominating petitions there will be many starters in the field.

The petitions of candidates for which the voters of Baker county will vote will, according to the primary law bear signatures as follows:

C. A. Johns for governor, 1900 signatures from at least seven counties of the state and ten per cent of the precincts in each of the seven counties.

James Withycombe and T. T. Geer for governor, the same number.

For secretary of state, state treasurer, state superintendent of public instruction, and other state offices in general, the same number of signatures as for governor and under the same conditions as the Republican ticket.

On the Democratic ticket Governor Chamberlain and other men seeking state offices will need but 599 signatures but the same conditions apply to as to counties.

In the congressional race, the Republican candidates, W. J. Lachner and W. B. Ellis will need 543 signatures to their petitions taken from one-fourth of the counties in the district and ten per cent of the precincts in the county. That makes four counties in the second district. James Harvey Graham, on the Democratic ticket, will need but 255 signatures to his petition.

For joint senators from Baker county Graham on the Democratic ticket, will need 2 per cent of the voters of his party from at least two counties and one-eighth of the precinct in each county.

For circuit judge of Baker county W. G. Drowley and any other Republican candidate will need 25 signatures. Judge White and Hon. William Smith will each need 25 signatures to their petitions.

These same figures apply to all city or county offices.

Compulsory School Law.

The last session of the legislature made some radical changes in the compulsory education act and the present act of the public school code, and parents are urged by the school authorities to familiarize themselves with the provisions of the new law, in order to be able to cooperate with the school board in enforcing it.

The portions of the new act to which particular attention is called are as follows:

Sec. 3. No child under the age of 14 years shall be employed at any work or labor of any kind, for wages or other compensation to whomsoever payable, during the hours when the public school of the town, district or city in which he or she resides, shall be in session.

Sec. 4.—Attendance at school shall be compulsory upon all children between the ages of 8 and 14 years in all cities, towns and villages in the state of Oregon, during the whole of the

school term in the city, town or village in which the child resides; and upon children in such city, town or village between the ages of 14 and 16 years who are not employed in some lawful labor.

Sec. 11.—Any person or corporation who shall employ a minor contrary to the provisions of this act, or who shall violate any of the provisions thereof, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than \$10 nor more than \$25 nor more than \$50 for the second offense, and be imprisoned for not less than 10 nor more than 30 days for the third and each succeeding offense.

Sec. 12.—Any parent or guardian who shall violate any of the provisions of this act, or who shall allow any child under their care or control contrary to the provisions of this act, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than \$5 nor more than \$25.

Rigid Economy for the Navy.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 25.—There is every reason to believe that the House naval committee will still further reduce the naval estimates in its revision of the departmental recommendations used as a basis for the annual naval appropriation act. It was hoped by those in charge of the public works at the navy yards and stations that congress would be more liberal this year than usual. Last year the appropriation for naval increases amounted to \$48,000,000, while that for public improvement, such as the equipment of naval repair plants, was \$2,500,000. This is not considered a fair proportion, and it has been maintained that with the increase in the navy and the larger volume of work which must be performed at naval stations, there

should be a more adequate provision for improvements of yards and whips and a betterment of the working facilities. The chief of the bureau of yards and docks has been before the House naval committee several times, and has strongly urged the claims of his department. It was evident however, that the committee was disposed to reduce at every turn the bureau estimates for yard improvements, and it will not be surprising to the navy department authorities if they find their recommendations materially reduced.

Selling Great Northern Holdings.

New York, Jan. 26.—In well informed financial circles it is understood that the Union Pacific Company has sold a part of its holdings in Great Northern preferred at an average price of \$300, and that the balance of the stock will be sold when the time is considered right to do so. In June the Union Pacific owned nearly \$15,000,000 of Great Northern stock, over \$24,000,000 of Northern Pacific, nearly \$13,000,000 of Northern Securities, and \$624,000 of Northern Securities stub stock. Prior to that time it had sold over \$7,000,000 of Northern Securities for about \$10,000,000, and by December 1 it had converted all its Northern Securities stock, receiving \$3,338,195 of Great Northern, \$4,900,080 of Northern Pacific, and \$9128,500 of stub stock. After the conversion the company held 225,034 shares of Great Northern, which, if it sold at \$300 a share, would net Union Pacific \$15,000,000 more than the initial cost of all the Hill stocks owned by the company. The Harbison venture into Northern Pacific in 1901 has netted the Union Pacific Company \$78,375,815, this calculation being based on the supposition that the Great Northern stock can be liquidated at \$300. By the investment of the cash profit from the sale of Great Northern at 5 per cent, together with the dividend on Northern Pacific and Northern Securities stubs, the company would receive an amount equal to 1 1/2 per cent a year on the entire amount of its common stock and convertible bonds.
