Hooligan in New York.

One of the realistic scenes in "Hooligan in New York," which will be seen for the first time in the Grand Opera House Saturday, January 27, is the actual reproduction of an opium joint in Mott street, in the heart of New York's Chinatown. The scene shows a Chinese laundry and back of it the den where victims of the drug inhale the poppy fumes. Mr. Kenyon, under whose supervision this scene was produced, was formerly at the United States legation at Hong Kong. While there he learned to speak the language of the country, and on his return to New York he made a careful study of the Chinese quarters of that city. His ability to converse with them in their native tongue gave him opportunities which few white men of education have secured, and he has staged a scene which is thrillingly realistic and correct in every detail.

At Cripple Creek.

E. J. Carpenter's "At Cripple Creek," will be presented at the Grand Opera House Wednesday January 29, by a company of extraordinary strength. The piece is by Hal Reid, author of "Human Hearts," and is a cleverly drawn picture of life among the Rocky Mountains. In sharp contrast is Martin Mason, a villain of the blackest dye. The Mexican Alvarez, is another subtly outlined figure, crafty and cunning in the way of crime. A car load of special scenery is carried for the production and no detail is overlooked which could add to the completeness and unity of the performance.
