School for Apprentices Opens.

Pittsburg, Pa., Jan. 29.—The first department of the school for apprentices and journeymen was opened here today in connection with the Carnegie Technical school. Three year's course in this school are offered to students desiring to pursue studies preparing them for service in any of the following occupations: Machinists, pattern makers, bricklayers, molders, blacksmiths, plumbers, electrical wiremen, sheet metal and cornice workers and sign painters. In every instance preference will be given to students who, when applying to the various classes for admission, are already at work as apprentices or journeymen. The instruction includes mechanical drawing and mathematics, shop practice and theory underlying the practice. Apprentices will receive two-thirds of their instruction in their several shops and one-third divided between lectures, class room and drawing room. Journeymen will receive two-thirds of their instruction in class room, drawing room and in lectures and one-third in the shops. Students must be at least 16 years old.

The school does not attempt to develop skilled mechanics, but offers a course of instruction to supplement the usual apprenticeship, strengthening the reasoning faculties and teach both the theory and the practice of the trades to those who are gaining their whole knowledge through practical operations while engaged in their daily employment. This system of instruction is adapted primarily to those pursuing mechanical occupations, and will advance them along their chosen line, enabling them to qualify for higher positions when opportunity affords, and to further develop their talent and natural skill. The attendance at the opening of the school today was greater than had been expected and additional matriculations will be made during the next few days.

Dog's Bone In a Man's Leg.

Grafting the bone from a dog's leg on to the leg of a man to replace some five inches of bone that had been removed, and so saving the man his leg, was the remarkable surgical feat performed by a local surgeon. It was the first recorded case of grafting upon the human bone of the bone of one of the lower animals.—San Francisco Chronicle.

AN ATHLETIC YOUNG LADY.

Mount Holyoke College Girl Does Wonderful Feats.

A special from South Hadley, Mass., says: By sprinting 100 yards in 10.25 seconds and doing her wonderful jumping feats, Miss Helen Buck of Mount Holyoke college girl, has electrified the athletic world.

She ran 100 yards in 10.25 seconds cleared 20 feet 1 inch in the broad jump, 5 feet 5 inches in the high exhibition game, and after all this exertion did not show the least trace of exhaustion. She is 5 feet 3 inches in height, weighs 135 pounds, and is 22 years old. Her remarkable ability is due to rational open air training extended over practically her entire life.

"My athletic training began as far back as I can remember," she explained. "It was conducted along the line recently recommended by a prominent college president—that is, up to my 10th year my physical education consisted in the out of door life of the natural fun loving boy."

"Such a life as this may not be possible for every girl, but it was very easy for one who has four brothers. I soon learned how to run, jump and throw a base ball in true boy fashion. Then one of my brothers taught me the correct methods of running and jumping."

Filed Their Notices.

Thomas F. Ryan, of Oregon City, today filed with the secretary of state notice of his candidacy for the nomination for the office of state treasurer, at the hands of the Republican voters.

G. M. Orton, of Portland, also filed a similar notice, stating that he would like to be state senator from the seventh district.

Attached to the filing of the former was the statement that he would "favor a law prohibiting using public funds for private gain, or corporation profit," while the latter "promises always to vote for the people's choice for United States senator," and signs pledge No. 1 in the primary law, which is to that effect.

ANTI SALOON LEAGUE

Dr. D. Paul Rader, the newly-selected superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, preached in Salem yesterday. At the Y. M. C. A., in the afternoon he spoke to the young men and in the evening delivered an address at the Methodist church to an audience that packed the auditorium.

Taking for his subject: "And There Wasted His Substance," Dr. Rader called attention to the great wastes of modern life. He said the sin of waste was the greatest sin of modern times. The energies of men and women were going to waste. Twenty percent of energy is used for working and 80 percent for loafing. The churches were great wastrels. A magnificent pile of stone work, a high-priced choir back of the pulpit, a high-salaried minister to preach, and 30 to 40 people in the pews—and the saloon men and evil disposed stand around and laugh. They get the money—they get the boys—they get many of the girls. In all of our cities we could see suits going by that ought to have men in them.

The great trouble was that men had a wrong kind of ambition. No man could afford to give up honor. At the close of his address Dr. Rader made an appeal for men who were willing to publicly say they would place themselves in such a position that they would be susceptible to Christ's call to work. About 20 young men responded.

Dr. Rader presented the cause of the Anti-Saloon League in a short statement, and distributed cards pledging financial support.

Rev. Selleck, the pastor of the church, then called the attention of the congregation to the Balance of Power League. This organization is secret in its membership and aims—to recommend to its members those candidates for election who they believe will do the most for the wiping out of vice and the saloon. The members sign a card, pledging themselves to vote for the candidate recommended by the league, or for the candidates that they believed would do the most for the moral interests of the community, regardless of party affiliations.

Both the Anti-Saloon League and the Balance of Power League work along the same lines and try to meet their opponents' craft with craft. They have three men now doing secret detective work, and are piling up evidence to submit to the voters in the coming campaign.
