### Palm Beach Motor Races.

Palm Beach, Fla., Jan. 30.—Lake Worth, that picturesque and tranquil spot of water near Palm Beach, is the scene of thousands of winter visitors and motor boat enthusiasts today and the hundreds of houseboats and other boats on the beautiful lake, all gaily decorated and filled with festively attired people, presented a highly attractive and picturesque sight. The regatta which attracted all these people, is the second annual regatta of the Palm Beach Motorboat association, which opened on Lake Worth today. The motor boat sport has been gaining popularity during the last few years and the number of entries is much greater this year than last year, when the first motor boat carnival was held here.

There will be three racing events today, and as many on Wednesday and Thursday. The first event today was a ten-mile race for motor boats with a length of hull of 30 feet or under. It started at 11 o'clock this forenoon and proved highly interesting, owing to the large number of contestants and the remarkable speed displayed. In the afternoon there will be two other races; one a ten mile race for motor boats 50 to 75 feet long; and a five mile race for motor boats 70 or more feet long. The rating measurements of the boats were computed by the American Powerboat association. The races are governed by the rules of the same organization, but any point not fully covered by these rules will be decided by the regatta committee, whose decisions on any question will be final. In each class in which two or more boats finish, a valuable prize will be awarded. A bonus for the best time over the mile will also be awarded.

Among the famous racing boats entered for the various events are the Dixie, Simplex III, the Allen, the Mercedes, the U. S. A., the Six Shooter, the Clarks, the White Fox, Topsy the Boastful, the Birchwood, the Dewey, the Andrews, the Lake Worth and several smaller boats of great speed.

The principal prize is the sterling challenger shield, awarded the Palm Beach Power Boat association by Sir Thomas R. Dewar. Other trophies were donated by William Reisk, H. M. Flagler, H. A. Lottier, the Royal Poinciana, the Breakers, the Beach club, W. Gould Brookaw and Greenfield and Crosby. The New York Motor Boat club will give a prize banner to the boat club winning the largest number of events during the carnival.

Among the visitors are many people who came to witness the Ormon-Daytona automobile races. Many of them will go on to Havana to see the automobile road races there next week.

### WONDERS OF FUTURE NEW YORK

Astounding Transportation Improvements Being Made—City Will be Revolutionized.

New York, Jan. 29.—Changes of revolutionary significance are being made in the conditions of life in New York. Sky scrapers are filling the narrow confines of Manhattan island—sky scraper offices, sky scraper apartment houses, sky scraper colleges, sky scraper churches—soon the city will be a vast workshop with an overwhelming demand for numberless trains to take the human workers to their homes in the suburbs in lightning like time.

To handle the local traffic from points near the city transportation lines are constantly multiplying their facilities by additional tracks, new stations and under-river tunnels.

The New York Central's huge new station is rendered necessary mainly by the crowding thousands who must be brought to and carried away from the city morning and evening. The Pennsylvania's station, the foundation for which now looks like the swath of a whirlwind through the densely built up section of the west side, will provide for only a tithe of the army that invades the New York shore from Jersey every morning only to swarm back again at night.

When transportation plans now under way are carried out, a map of Manhattan island will look like a centipede from every side of which will stream the lines indicating tunnels, ferries and bridges, to Jersey, to Brooklyn, to Long Island City, and additional lines of rails to the northward, spreading fan like from the Hudson to the Connecticut line and beyond.

The steam railways, rapidly as they increase their facilities, cannot keep up with the suburban traffic. This has shown the opportunity for high speed electric railways. From the terminus of the subway at 177th street, a new road, the New York, Westchester & Boston, is being built to consist of four tracks over private right of way and with no grade crossings.

This line will mark an epoch in suburban transportation. It will be of a perfect construction as modern engineering can make it. Penetrating the heart of beautiful Westchester county, the road will run to Portchester on the New York-Connecticut boundary line, and to White Plains, on the foothills of the Berkshires. The line is being built for electric express traffic at a mile a minute; locals will run as fast as 45 miles an hour. The whole line and branches cover only 36 miles, but its road bed and equipment are the same or better than the steam railroads maintain. With such roads as this the city can be emptied of its out of town workers comfortably and quickly. The old style, one-car trolley in suburban traffic is giving way to the high speed electric train. If the city of the future is to be only a work shop, the new Westchester road shows how the workers will go to and from their labors. This is the type of railway that will solve the problem of over population in cities.
