The Electric Road.

A Portland paper says: "Work on the grade of the road projected from Portland to Salem by the Willamette Valley Traction Company is being steadily carried forward, and four miles of the work has already been completed, says W. J. Clarke, of Gervais, who was in Portland yesterday. Gangs of graders are busy at the Salem end, and there is every prospect of the line being completed and put in operation during the coming summer."

"People of Marion county believe arrangements have been entered into by the promoters of the line and the Southern Pacific whereby the round-about route of the road was located, leaving the country served by the Southern Pacific entirely free from interference by the electric line. It was expected in Salem and in nearby valley towns that the route would pass through Brooks, Gervais and Woodburn, but instead a detour has been made, leaving these places, which are stations on the Southern Pacific, entirely alone. The natural course of the new road, say Marion county people, would be to strike these towns, but instead the line is planned to pass through the country between them and the river, reaching the Willamette at Boone's ferry or Champoug. From Salem the road will run through the rich French Prairie district, reaching the Wilsonville coun-

Goddard Gets a Few Deeds.

H. Goddard, the wealthy timberman, of LaCrosse, Wis., who, perhaps, purchased more of the forged Oregon land certificates than any other man, appeared before the state land board this morning, to have deeds issued on the few genuine certificates that he holds. They are genuine on the face of them, but Governor Chamberlain is convinced that the original certificates were obtained by fraud, and hence voted against the issuance of the deeds. Dunbar and Moore, however, were of the opinion that Goddard was an innocent purchaser, and so voted to issue the deeds.

Goddard says that he is willing to prosecute Puter and McKinley, and when asked why he did not order the arrest of McKay, in Seattle, at the time he was located by West, stated that he could not at that time understand what connection McKay had with the case. He claims to have received a letter from Puter dated at San Francisco December 10th, which was delayed several days in delivery. This was the last known communication that any known persons has had with either Puter or McKinley.

Live Stock Men Form Merger.

Denver, Colo., Jan. 30.—The joint convention of the American Stock Growers' Association and the National Live Stock Association opened here today. The two organizations recently decided to form a merger, the new corporation to be known as the National Live Stock Commission, whose membership will be made up entirely of producing interests, and which shall be a general central assembly or clearing house for all national live stock and breeders' associations, the bodies to be co-ordinate with each other. The National Live Stock Commission is to appoint standing committees from the various interests, including the packers and railroads, these committees to be made up with a majority of their personal actual producers.

Blames Those Who Landed.

Seattle, Jan. 30.—At the morning session of the Valencia investigation Louis Allison, an old man and a survivor, said that all day Tuesday and Wednesday were calm, and that they could have launched boats if they had them. He criticized the men of the two parties that made a landing for not trying to help, and said Bunker was the only man who tried to get to the wrecked steamer after landing, and he alone could not. He said one landed party was not more than 200 feet from the wreck. The greatest fault he found was that no efforts were made the following day to render assistance. Albert Willis, a naval apprentice, corroborated Allison.

Society Girl a Heroine.

San Francisco, Jan. 30.—A letter received by Dr. VanWyck of this city, from W. A. Peters, brother-in-law of Miss Laura Van Wyck, one of the Valencia wreck victims, tells of the bravery of that young woman in the dangerous hours following the wreck of the steamer. Mr. Peters interviewed some of the survivors, and in his letter says:

"The men are full of accounts of Laura's bravery. They called her the girl with the gray coat, and told how she and the stewardess cheered up all of the people. Laura took a little boy, whose mother was drowned, and cared for him. She kept him with her, and tried to keep him warm. The men also told how she sang hymns at night."

In Circuit Court.

As a result of the forenoon session of the equity department of the circuit court, Judge Galloway made two docket entries as follows. The case of Char. Scott, assignee, vs. D. M. Smith, et al., was continued until a later date on stipulation of counsel.

A. C. Dunc, defaulted in the divorce case in which he is the defendant.

"At Cripple Creek."

One of the best melodramas that has appeared in Salem in a long time was that of "At Cripple Creek," which showed at the Grand last evening. The theatre was packed from the gallery to the footlights, and one and all enjoyed the play. This was fully evidenced by the round after round of applause.

SUPREME COURT OPINION

The supreme court today decided petitions for rehearing in the case of the State of Oregon vs. Grover State vs. Moses Taylor and the State vs. Josiah Smith. Martin is a ten-year sentence in the penitentiary for killing his sweetheart's father Milton; Taylor is the wealthy la rancher, who was convicted of attempting to burn the barn and of a neighbor, while Smith is now in the city of Astoria out of \$2000.

Three decisions were also handed down by the court today. The case of Huffman vs. Smith was reversed and remanded, Smyth won in the court below. Justice Blaine wrote the opinion.

This case involves two important questions: First, the right of a settler upon unsurveyed public lands undisturbed possession thereof for the purpose of filing a homestead thereon as soon as the lands are surveyed, second, whether or not the exercise and confinement of such settler in the penitentiary after having established a residence on such lands constitutes an abandonment. The court holds that such a settler has a right to the undisturbed possession of such land, and court of equity will protect his possession against trespassers, but that the involuntary absence of a settler from his claim, by reason of confinement in the penitentiary is not itself abandonment of his rights. The latter point is one never before passed upon by this supreme court; the reason for the decision being that legal abandonment consists of voluntary relinquishment of a right, coupled with the intention to abandon the same.

The case of George Lassus vs. Lott McCarty was reversed. McCarty won the decision in the lower court. This was a Baker county case, being a suit to foreclose a \$1500 mortgage.

The case of Elsie T. Mount vs. Bert McAnlay, et al., was reversed. This was another Baker county case, and was a suit to clear cloud from title caused by tax deed.
