Y. P. Missionary Institute.

Minneapolis, Minn., Jan. 31.—Hundreds of delegates from all parts of the United States are here at present to attend the Young People's Missionary institute, which opened here today. The missionary movement among young people started in New York in 1900. It is practically a federation of fifteen denominational missionary boards for the promotion of missionary work among young people. Its executive committee is composed of the secretaries of the different boards. The chief work of the movement is educational in character. It is being promoted by the preparation and publication of missionary text books, circulating libraries and missionary literature for young people, and annual training conferences in the great metropolitan centers of the United States and Canada. The organization has collected and exhibited a large missionary display. This includes missionary literature of all the missionary boards, and curious and interesting material from missionary fields throughout the world. This exhibit is kept in New York and has been shown in a dozen different cities.

The present conference is one of the most important features of this movement. Most of the delegates come from St. Paul, Minneapolis and other cities of the state, but there are also delegates from young people's societies in all parts of the northwest and the United States in general. The meetings of the institute are held in Westminster church. The conference will last three days.

To Complete Important Deal.

Jersey City, Jan. 31.—The stockholders of the United Railways Investment company of San Francisco are holding a meeting here today, and it is expected that in that meeting action will be taken to increase the common stock of that corporation from \$10,000,000 to \$25,000,000 and approve of the deal for the taking over of a large block of the stock of the Philadelphia company of Pittsburgh, the deal having been under consideration and negotiations for several months. The plans for this transfer of the Philadelphia stock are as yet only partially known and there has been much guessing as to the actual extent of the control that the United Railways Investment company has secured in the Pittsburgh corporation. It is said that the total amount of the deal runs from \$40,000,000 to \$55,000,000, but officials of the Philadelphia company in Pittsburgh have scouted this proposition as impossible, particularly with the small increase of capital of the buyer.

The approval of the terms, whatever they are, by the stockholders of the United Railways Investment company, will bring the deal to a head in a short time, however, and the details will then become known.

The present capital stock of the California company is now \$25,000,000, of which \$15,000,000 is preferred stock. With the increase of the common shares it will have a capital stock of \$40,000,000. The new stock of the company is to be used in paying for a portion of the Philadelphia stock. The deal is said to be for the payment of \$37.50 in a collateral trust bond with the company's own guarantee attached and also \$20 in its own stock for each share of the Philadelphia company's stock, making the Philadelphia stock bring in the paper of the new concern at \$57.50, or \$7.50 a share above par.

Where the stock of the Philadelphia company, that is to go into that deal, comes from and how much of it is involved, is not known. From what Pittsburgh officials of the corporation say, the offer is not as attractive to them as it seems to be to eastern holders.

Stories concerning the reorganization of the Philadelphia company under the new deal have been circulating, but they are denied here. There is said to be no basis for such a change and it could not come without reason or unless a majority control of the company was passing into new hands. There is in the report that the Philadelphia company is arranging a loan of \$15,000,000 in eastern financial circles, however, a basis of fact, and it is claimed that the loan will be easily secured. This loan is said to be intended to cover improvements and extensions in properties, most of which, it is expected, will go into the traction lines of the Pittsburgh railways company.

Give Way to Jamestown.

Richmond, Va., Jan. 31.—The friends and promoters of the Jamestown exposition are highly elated over the information that the promoters of the Alaska-Yukon exposition, which was also planned for the year 1907, have decided to withdraw from the field and to postpone their exposition till 1909, thus leaving the Jamestown exposition a free field, without dangerous opposition.

The Alaska-Yukon club of Seattle, of which J. E. Chilberg is president and W. E. Sheffield secretary, had been devoting its time to a propaganda for the purpose of organizing an Alaska-Yukon exposition in 1907. A short time ago the promoters of the Jamestown position wrote a letter to the president of the Alaska-Yukon club, requesting the club to postpone their planned exposition, to avoid competition with the Jamestown exposition.

The Alaska-Yukon club gave due consideration to the request of the Jamestown exposition promoters and decided that it would be better for both parties to postpone the Alaska-Yukon exposition for two years. Numerous requests from various branches of the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution for a postponement of the Alaska-Yukon exposition added weight to the request of the exposition people and the postponement of the northern fair was decided on.

A FOOL WITH A GUN

Cottage Grove, Or., Jan. 31.—Kull Keizer was shot and killed last evening while coming home on the Oregon & Southeastern railroad, by a gun in the hands of Walter Foley, who is said to have been drunk. Foley was very proud of a new rapid-fire gun he had just purchased, and pointed it at different passengers on the train. He was urged to desist, and finally sat down by the side of Mr. Keizer.

It is said the weapon was accidentally discharged. The ball went through Keizer's left hand and stomach and lodged under his heart. He was brought home, and died shortly afterward.

A warrant has been sworn out for Foley, but he has not yet been captured. When he was last seen he said he was going to Latham to stay all night, and will, no doubt, be in the hands of Constable Atkins in a short time.

Mr. Keizer is an old and honored resident of this place. He had been keeping a boarding house up Sharp's creek, on the Bohemia road, for a few years, and was thereby able to keep himself and wife. He always had a good word, a smile and a warm fire for his guests, and he will be sadly missed. He was about 70 years of age, and left an aged wife and several children. Foley is well known here. He has been an excessive drinker for some months.

Bought Eugene Mill.

The Eugene woolen mill will again be in operation within 60 days. Such is the announcement made by Thos. B. Kay, of the Thos. Kay Woolen Mill Company, of Salem, to a Guard reporter this forenoon.

For some time past Mr. Kay has been contemplating the purchase of the local mill, and has made several trips to this city with that end in view. The plant was thoroughly examined, and finally it was decided to purchase it from its present owners, J. P. Wilbur and Will Wright, of Union, who bought the mill a year ago this month, as a speculative deal.

In the interview with Mr. Kay the reporter learned that the mill will be operated by a company organized in Salem, of which the Thos. Kay Woolen Mill Company will be the principal stockholders. Employees of the mill there will hold stock in the concern, as well as a number of Eugene men, including P. L. Chambers, president of the Chambers-Bristow bank, of this city. The new concern will be incorporated under the name of the Eugene Woolen Mill Company, and will take formal possession of the property tomorrow, the final papers in the deal to be signed at Salem at that time.—Eugene Guard.

Urges the Irish Cause.

St. Paul, Minn., Jan. 31.—Dr. Douglas Hyde, president of the Gaelic league of Ireland, who is now on a tour of the United States in the interest of that organization, will deliver an address at a large meeting to be held at the People's church this evening. He arrived in this country last November, has lectured in nearly all the large cities in the east and stopped here on his way to the Pacific coast.

Wherever he has spoken, Dr. Hyde has been listened to with a great deal of interest and accorded a hearty welcome. His appearance in St. Paul will be under the auspices of the Ancient Order of Hibernians. Dr. Hyde has been connected with the movement of the Gaelic league for 12 years and has made great personal sacrifices to carry on the work. He is paying his own travelling expenses, for all his efforts in behalf of the project are a labor of love. He was graduated from Trinity college, Dublin, speaks five languages, and has a wide reputation in Europe as a scholar and He is accompanied on this trip by his wife, who is an Austrian.
