GOLDSON ONCE MORE.

Brother Dissatisfied With Jury's Finding.

J. H. D. Goldson, of Goldson, brother of Mr. Goldson, who was recently killed by a gunshot, was in Eugene yesterday to give his views on the manner in which the unfortunate affair occurred. Mr. Goldson contends that his brother was not killed by his own gun, and that the verdict of the jury which sat on the case, is not in keeping with the facts. He had with him his brother's gun, which is claimed to have done the damage. There are no marks of panther's teeth on the gun. The ejector was wide open when it was found, and Mr. Goldson says a panther would not open the ejector on a gun, even if he did fire it. So the theory that the panther discharged the gun is while shaking it is past belief. There are no signs on the gun to show that the dead man had clubbed it in fighting the panther. Mr. Goldson is firmly convinced that his brother did not meet his death in the manner reported, and is looking

up legal advice on the happenings. He believes the deceased came to his death at the hands of an excited hunter, and says he will not rest until he shows the public that he is correct. He gives other reasons for his opinion, and will make a statement in the Register in a few days.—Eugene Register.
