OREGON'S SILENT SCHOOL

Where the Deaf and Dumb
are Educated and Taught
Useful Trades

It is only a short time since E. S. Tillinghast, the new superintendent of the state school for the deaf and dumb, took charge, but in that time he and Mrs. Tillinghast have made themselves very popular with the students. The work of the school is going on with renewed vigor and the pupils show a remarkable degree of proficiency in the different grades.

The school, which is situated about five miles from Salem, is graded from the primary to the grammar grades, each grade under competent instructors. Only two teachers in the school can hear, they being in charge of the two lower grades. Two of the present students will take examination for entrance to college this year to train for teachers, and another student will graduate from the school.

Each pupil spends half of the day in class work and the other half in learning some useful trade. There is a well equipped carpenter shop, a shoe shop and a laundry. Five of the students are learning to be printers and they do all the work of setting up and printing the school weekly paper, the "Webfoot." A practical printer is in charge of the office.

The boys and girls study in the same classes, but for other work are divided. The girls do the house work, but the boys have to wash their own dishes and make their own beds. All the bread eaten in the institution is baked by three of the boys.

The girls' and boys' dormitories occupy opposite ends of the building, the average number in each room being eight.

The gymnasium is a very popular room during the rainy season and both the boys and girls have basketball teams. In the fine weather a large athletic field gives ample opportunity for out door sport.

The distance from Salem is a great drawback to this school, as with the present facilities the students can only get into the city once in two months. The superintendent states that the exclusion from the society of the other children is a hindrance to the best development of those who are deaf and dumb, and if the school were located in Salem, the progress of the scholars would be much better.

Although the Mute school is only a half mile from the Oregon State Reform school, the boys of the two schools are not allowed to associate with each other.

The Oregon State School for Deaf Mutes has the distinction of teaching the only Chinese deaf and dumb child in any American school. This bright girl of about seven summers comes from a Chinese home in Portland.
