Hanged for Murder.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 2.—William Walter Hamilton, a negro, convicted of the murder of Lizzie Lyman on June 29, 1904, was hanged this morning in the district jail to expiate his crime. Hamilton remained calm to the very end, and there was no hitch in the execution.

Hamilton had two trials. The first verdict of murder in the first degree was set aside on a technicality, and a new trial granted, which resulted in a conviction. Sentence was passed fixing the execution for November 10th, last, but, owing to the pending of an appeal to the district court of appeals, the hanging was postponed. The court of appeals confirmed the judgment of the lower court, however, and the execution was set for today.

MORE MEN IN FIELD

Three Candidates for the Legislature Who Willingly Take Pledges

Three candidates for the legislature have filed their declarations of intention to become candidates for the legislature, and all three take pledges to respect the people's choice for United States senator. W. A. Taylor of Macleay limits his pledge to the candidate receiving the most Republican votes, but the other two take a pledge for the people's choice unqualified.

Scott Riggs of Salem, one of the Citizens' city council, comes out as a candidate for county treasurer. D. F. Lane of this city has filed for coroner. The legislative candidates who have filed are as follows:

Jerome D. Simmons, Monitor: "I promise always to vote for the people's choice for U. S. senator."

Wm. A. Cherrington, Salem: "I promise always to vote for the people's choice for U. S. senator."

W. A. Taylor, of Macleay, declares that he "will always vote for the candidate for U. S. senator who has received the highest number of Republican votes for that position at the general election next preceding the election of a senator in congress, without regard to my individual preference."

H. A. Crossan, of Salem, has filed his declaration of intention to be a candidate for county clerk.
