BUSINESS MAN HOP GROWER

Versus College Professor [and Ex-President of the University]

In a recent number of the Newburg Graphic two pages were taken to roast Walter L. Toose of Woodburn, the Republican candidate for congress, and indirectly boost Professor Hawley, ex-president of Willamette university, for the same place. In making a short tour of the second congressional district we thought Walter Toose seemed to have all the other candidates for congress "on the hip," so to speak, and we took occasion to say so in these columns; hence the above items in the Graphic.

As to "butting in" and "shinnying on our own side," we beg to remind the Graphic man that a congressman is not merely a local official. We do, of course, elect them by districts; but in a broad and liberal sense our congressmen represent the whole state. There are weighty questions, of great import to Oregon, which do not concern districts or sections, but the state at large. Hence every citizen in the state is deeply concerned in the election of both of our congressmen.

And if the Graphic editor will keep both eyes open he will see that many other newspapers from this district will take a hand in the contest in his district, and many persons in his district will comment on the congressional struggle in this district—and very properly, too.

The editor of the Graphic seems to take the candidacy of Walter Toose as a personal affront. He boils over with indignation at every mention of Mr. Toose for congress. Can it be true, as many of Mr. Toose's friends claim, that if the Graphic editor was the Newburg postmaster he would be at present enrolled under the Toose banner?

And the Graphic avers that many of the newspaper which are supporting Mr. Toose are doing so because they

We said in our former item that Mr. Toose would more than likely be nominated, and his chances are growing better every day. There was a well attended meeting of fruit growers at the city hall yesterday afternoon. All of them were subscribers to stock in the new co-operative cannery and the object of the meeting was to perfect an organization. A motion declaring it to be the sense of the meeting that they immediately proceed to organize under the incorporation laws of Oregon was unanimously adopted by a rising vote of all present. Upon motion, the following named committee was appointed to take the necessary legal steps to perfect the organization: George W. Weks, Noah Welch, S. P. Kimball, C. A. H. Fisher and L. K. Page.

After a hearty discussion of all the phases of the subject which showed that those present were in dead earnest for a cannery, the meeting adjourned to reconvene and hear the report of the committee next Tuesday at 2 o'clock p. m. The spirit of the whole meeting was such as to convince anyone that the gentlemen mean business, and that they propose to have a cannery which will help them dispose of their fruit. Propositions will be received from several sources relative to the business details of the new corporation.
