It is understood that a determined effort will be made by the association to make war on all persons who endanger the health of the people by spitting on the floors of street cars. There is an ordinance against spitting on the floors of cars. The law clearly recognizes that the practice is not only filthy, but extremely unsanitary, but the street car conductors make no effort to prevent passengers from expectorating on the car floors. Their excuse is that requests on passengers not to spit on floors of the cars frequently lead to altercations and even violence and that by such disturbances the conductors endanger their positions, as the street car companies do not support them, but side with the passengers. The physicians will try to convince the managers of the street car lines that spitting in the cars should be suppressed by all means and the conductors who attempt to enforce the law should receive the hearty support of the companies.
