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PRESIDING ELDER ROWLAND.

Conducts Services in Salem for the First Time Sunday.

Rev. Dr. B. F. Rowland, the newly appointed presiding elder of the East Portland district, of this conference, of the Methodist Episcopal church, preached in Salem yesterday for the first time. A large congregation greeted him at both services in the First M. E. church.

Dr. Rowland is an eloquent preacher, and his sermons yesterday gave evidence of much careful preparation. Preaching entirely without notes he held the closest attention of his hearers. In the morning he preached from the text "I Am the Way, the Truth and the Life," holding that, instead of this text meaning three distinct things it really means and might be read "I am the true way to life."

His evening subject was from the sixth chapter of Isaiah. The year that King Uzziah died was an important year in the world. It was shortly after Romulus was born, and just before Rome was founded. It was when God began to prepare the way for the Roman conquest of the world, when He began to harden the heart of Israel and lead that people to their final overthrow.

Among the lessons brought out, he called attention to the fact that the seraphim spoken of in the chapter used two wings to work and four for reverence and worship. Man did not follow their example in his time for work and worship. The seraph, the holiest angel in heaven, dared not touch the coal on the altar, but used demands this or that. That was God's demand this or that. That was God's business. Man in his rationalism might think God too particular. Rationalism was culpable stupidity.

The coal touched Isaiah's lips, the seat of his trouble. Religion had nothing to do with symptoms. It struck at the seat of disease. When the disease of sin was cured the symptoms would disappear. Religion was a fiery, burning love. Religion meant loving God better than self, and loving our fellow men as well as ourselves. Religion was a personal thing God spoke in general terms. Isaiah applied it to himself. So today, men must apply religion to themselves. Religion, when properly applied, meant pardon, regeneration and sanctification for the individual.

The quarterly love feast of the church was held just prior to the evening service, and was largely attended. Over one hundred persons spoke in testimony of salvation.

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Do Not Need International Law. Washington, D. C., Feb. 5.—Professor G. O. Wilson of Brown university is not to be re-employed next year as lecturer on international law at naval war college. He has held place incidentally for several years, and has received \$1000 for the delivery of a series of lectures to the staff officers at Newport and the preparation of a departmental edition, or less confidential, of those lectures. For some time it has been thought that Professor Wilson was entitled to an increase of compensation, and this year the naval authorities have urged the house naval committee to make the additional allowance, with the result that a discussion of the wisdom of employing Professor Wilson or any other authority has been precipitated. It is held by some of the members of the naval committee that the knowledge of international law, so far as it need be discussed by naval commanders, should be acquired at the naval academy, and that sound common sense and the academic training should prevail to keep the naval commander out of trouble and on the right side of any question which may come up requiring the exercise of individual judgment, unprompted by higher authority. The bureau of Navigation, however, in urging that there be no change in that system of instruction in the post graduate course at Newport, insists that the maintenance of not be sacrificed on the ground of economy or on the theory that naval officers have no need of the services of Professor Wilson. Reference is made to a number of cases in which the commander of American vessels were confronted with highly delicate questions of international law, which they would probably not have been able to cope with in the proper manner, had it not been for the instruction received from Professor Wilson.

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
