Y. M. C. A. Notes.

The indoor baseball game for the championship between the Reds and the Blues at the Y. M. C. A. gymnasium last night resulted in a score of 10 to 5 in favor of the Blues after eight innings of hard playing, in which it would be hard to say which had the advantage.

At the close of the game General Secretary Fisher mounted a seat to announce the result of the membership contest, which came to a close Saturday night. The large crowd wore eager for the news, and waited with breathless interest for the final announcement.

The judges, after careful consideration, have decided that the voters' statements were about equal and have called them a tie. The other points in the contest have been canvassed thoroughly, and the following is the result: Blues 10,464; Reds 12,000 and pandemonium broke loose. For ten minutes the Reds tried to make themselves heard in Portland. The total score of the Reds was 12,494, or 1940 points more than their opponents.

The date for the banquet has not yet been fixed, but will be decided in a few days. It may be that the Reds will vote to donate the cost of the supper to the swimming pool fund. The receipts of the baseball game amounted to \$28.90, and will go toward this fund.

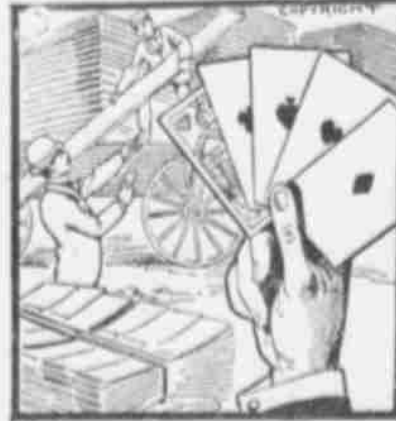
