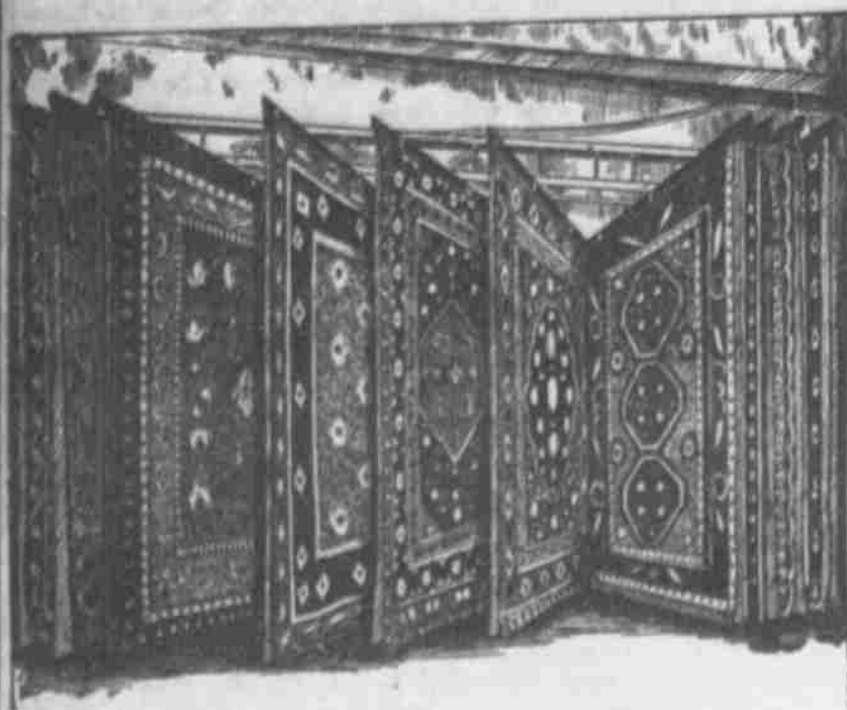

SILVERTON FARMERS SHIPPERS CONGRESS

And Good Roads Convention Program for Feb. 14-15th

Wednesday and Thursday of Next Week Will Be Devoted to Boosting That Live Town

(Silverton Farmers' Congress.)
Arrangements are planned for a big time at Silverton on Wednesday and Thursday, the 14th and 15th, the dates of the Farmers' and Shippers' Congress. D. V. Vaughn of that city was in Salem yesterday and held a conference with Col. E. Hofer, president of the Willamette Valley Development League, and County Judge Scott, in which they formulated the program for the meeting as given below. On Wednesday afternoon and evening the exercises will be in the new opera house and will be followed by a banquet. The proceedings will be completed Thursday forenoon.

Silverton people are preparing for a large crowd. The farmers of the surrounding country are interesting themselves in the affair, and a number of public men from various parts of the state will be present, besides the several candidates in Marion county, who are all invited. The railroads have made reduced rates of transportation, which will bring large crowds from up and down the valley. The Silverton band and orchestra have been engaged for the occasion, and a pleasant time provided for in every way. 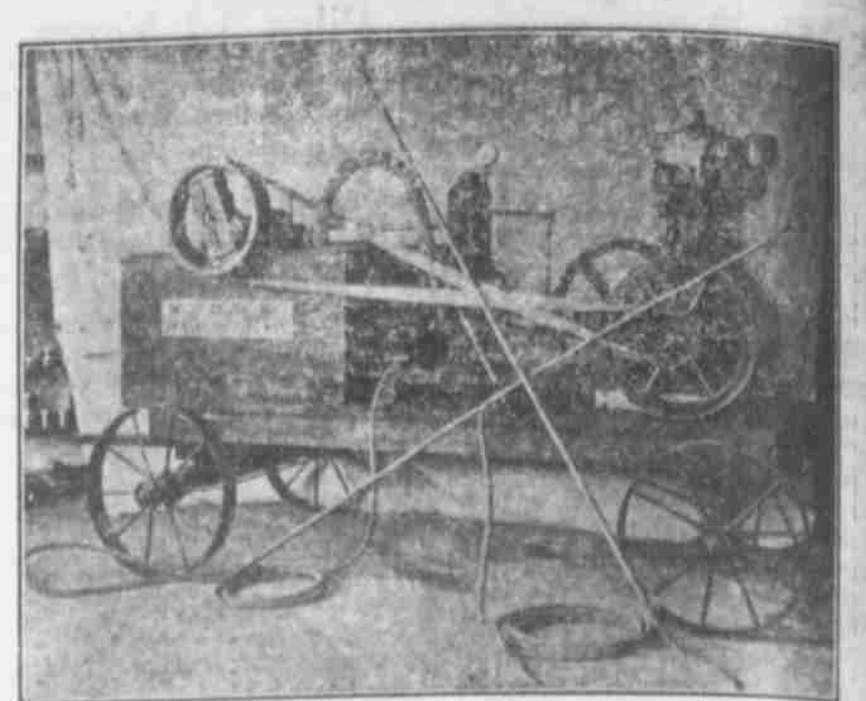

POWER SPRAY OUTFITS

We have been very successful in fitting up satisfactory spray outfits for large users.
Here is a photo of one of our most satisfactory rigs, and this we have duplicated several times. It consists of a Fairbanks-Morse 2 H-P gasoline engine, connected up with any of several makes of pumps, complete with pressure gauge and relief valve, and with agitator in the tank to keep the mixture stirred.
The tank is of 180 gallons capacity and the engine furnishes plenty of power to deliver the spray through four nozzles at 125 pounds pressure. The engine can be detached at any time and used for other purposes.
There are a total of eight of these outfits adjacent to Salem, and we are now getting out another.
