Refused to
Advertise

A special to the Indianapolis News
from Marion, Ind., says that after a
hard fight of seventeen years against
competitors who advertised, Gunder
Broas, dry goods merchants, the oldest
mercantile firm in Marion and at one
time the largest retail house in north-
ern Indiana, have given up the hope-
less struggle and sold out their busi-
ness.

When gas was discovered in Marion
the town began to grow rapidly, and
competition in all business was soon
encountered by all the old local mer-
chants. The new merchants adver-
tised, but many of the old established
firms were slow in believing that it
was necessary for them to use print-
ers' ink, as they knew nearly every
man in the county. All of them who
are now in business concluded that it
was necessary to advertise in order to
hold what trade they had and to in-
crease it, except Gunder Broas, who
absolutely refused, claiming it was
money thrown away. The firm had the
best business site in the city, but the
store was never filled with shoppers.
Thousands passed and repassed the
place day after day without stopping.
The firm carried an excellent line of
goods and treated customers well, but
only a few farmers and some of the
old citizens of Marion patronized the
place. The store is now closed for in-
voice.

Most merchants now agree that ad-
vertising is a necessity and that the
best medium is the local paper.

They can be mailed, handed in at
the Journal office, or given to any
member of the Journal staff. If ad-
dressed as above, they will receive

desk and not be kept with the other
correspondence of the Journal.

All who write manuscript for the con-
test should bear in mind the rules
regarding copy. Write on one side of
the paper only, and use pen and ink
or typewriter. If this rule is not fol-
lowed the manuscript will not be con-
sidered. It is only fair to the judges
to do this, as improperly prepared
manuscript is much harder to read.

In preparing copy to be submitted in
the second contest, the advertisement
should be written in one of two ways.
Either one large sheet of paper with
the headings or paragraphs arranged
as the writer wishes it to appear,
if printed, should be used, or else
the copy should be on separate sheets
and a dummy prepared showing how
the different parts of the advertise-
ment should be arranged. Copy for
the advertisement must also be writ-
ten in pen and ink or with typewriter,
and on one side of the sheet only.
