**M'GINNIS
VERSUS
CITY**

**Judge Galloway Re-
verses City of Sa-
lem on Suit**

**Complaint Charged Too Much
and Ordinance Would
Not Hold Water**

The case of the City of Salem vs. Hattie McGinnis on a charge of vagrancy, and living in a house of ill-fame, at O. Condit for city and Carson & Cannon and Webster Holmes for defendant; writ of review on appeal from City Recorder Moore, who found her guilty.

The petition sets forth the ordinance defining vagrancy, and charges the defendant with not having a home, etc.

The city, by its attorney, moved to dismiss the writ on the ground of not being sufficiently specific.

The court held there was no justification to call defendant a vagrant, and sustained demurrer on ground of charging several offences in one writ. In Nichols' case wasn't claimed he had any visible means of support. In this case the pleadings did not set out with sufficient force that defendant was a vagrant. She showed tax receipts on property. The code nor the ordinances defined vagrancy, and it could not be confused with disorderly conduct and breaches of the peace. Definitions of vagrancy could not be enlarged by ordinances. The court could not sanction the order of the city recorder. Mr. Condit could not see how two offences were charged. The city had a right and had the power to define vagrancy. The court could not agree with him. The city had no right to say that an idle person was necessarily a vagrant. The ordinance was held invalid, and the complaint was insufficient. The case against Mrs. McGinnis was dismissed.

the rest are certainly the cutest and
sweetest in this broad valley. A first
class physician attends to our sick.

can the electric line afford to miss us?
How can we get along without it?
Let us have this electric line through

noy.

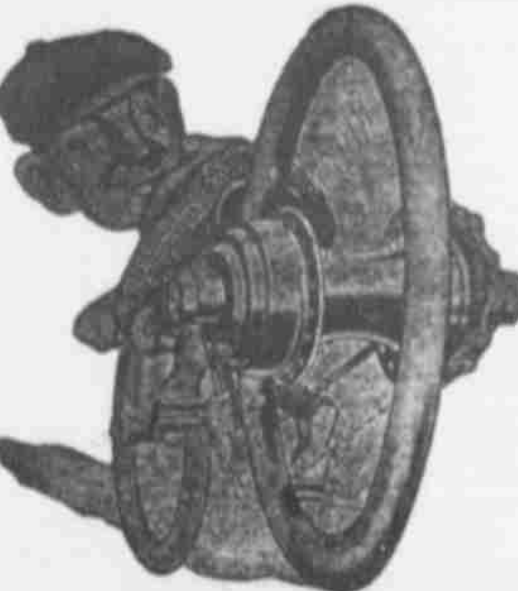
Visiting Fraternal Brotherhood.
