Probably the Salem Thieves.

The following dispatch to the Tele-
gram from Harrisburg will be inter-
esting Salem news, inasmuch as the
Leroy bicycle mentioned is probably
the one that was stolen Sunday from
Henry Schulz, of this city, and the
rider of the same is possibly the man
who relieved Goldstone, the San Fran-
cisco traveling man of his purse and
gold the same day.

Both men are now in jail at Albany,
and a full description of them and the
wheels will be received by the officers
there this afternoon.

Harrisburg, Or., Feb. 6.—George
Maulthy and J. E. Cole, giving their
home as at St. Paul, were arrested
yesterday about four miles north of
this city, and bound over to the cir-
cuit court, charged with entering the
farm house of August Sperling and
taking a watch. They were traveling
through the country on bicycles, and
say they left Portland Friday.

One had three watches, one of
which was identified by Adolph Sper-
ling as his, they having taken it be-
tween 12 and 1 o'clock. One of the
other watches was gold, the other sil-
ver. They also had a large bunch of
keys, including two skeleton keys.

The bicycles appear to be new
wheels, and are provided with mud-
guards of oilcloth, similar to those
commonly used in the cities at this
time of year, and both had Solar
lamps. One of the wheels was a Le-
roy No. 73,109, the other a National,
No. 34,809.

BIGGER THAN 1905

Travel to Pacific Northwest
Next Summer Is Like-
ly to Exceed

Those Who Have Seen and
Those Who Have Merely
Heard Are Coming

A bigger travel to the northwest
than during the Lewis and Clark ex-
position year is predicted for the sum-
mer by W. A. Cox, general agent of
the Chicago & Northwestern railway,
who has just returned from a business
trip to Chicago, Philadelphia, Boston
Indianapolis and other points.

"If the railroads put in sum-
mer rates that are now under consid-
eration in the east, I positively be-
lieve the travel to this coast this year
will equal, if it does not exceed, that
of last year in Portland," said Mr.
Cox.

This statement, coming seriously
from one of the best informed rail-
road traffic men, fresh from the mid-
dle west and eastern territory from
which Oregon expects to draw invest-
ors, settlers and tourists this year,
will surprise most people. It is said
that few realize the immense travel
that will come from the east to the
Pacific coast this year.

Mr. Cox closely observed indications
that came within his view on the trip
east, and his opinion is based on per-
sonal knowledge of what he saw and
heard. He says the people who came
to the Lewis and Clark fair have done
an immense amount of effective ad-
vertising for the Pacific northwest, and
not only are many of the same people
coming back, but thousands of oth-
ers whom they have told of the re-
sources, opportunities and general
favorable conditions here. Mr. Cox
said:

The Exposition Did It.

"The Lewis and Clark exposition did
more for the Pacific coast than any
other exposition has ever done for a
country. The Louisiana Purchase ex-
position was a great thing, but it bene-
fitted chiefly the city of St. Louis. The
conditions around that city did not al-
low of extensive results favorable to
the country, as it was already devel-
oped. Oregon has all the wealth of
resources of eastern state and then
some more. The thing lacking is pop-
ulation and capital. The people of
the east are at last seeing this fact.
The railroads are realizing that the
Pacific Northwest is really the only
great region remaining for exploita-
tion. They are now giving it serious
attention."

Mr. Cox added that announcements
might soon be looked for from the
railroads giving low summer rates for
round trips to the Pacific coast, and
that there would be an immense travel
besides the colonist and tourist
travel to this coast. There will be
large conventions in California and
a large proportion of the delegates will
arrange their trip to come or return
via the northern routes. They want
to see the county that has been so
much talked about in connection with
the fair. Old men who have boys are
investigating here for the younger
generation. He met men of wealth
who have no plans of their own for
development but who are convinced
that Oregon is the place for their
sons.

Railroad Advertising Effective.

Eastern people who have been ac-
customed to traveling abroad are be-
ginning to realize that there is some-
thing to see in this wonderful—the
Pacific northwest. The enormous
volume of railroad advertising that
has been done and is still being car-
ried on exploiting this part of the United
States is bringing actual results
as all good advertising will. Men
with capital to invest are seeking the
openings that are now known to ex-
ist here for making large profits on
investments.

Regarding the building into this
territory by the Northwestern line,
Mr. Cox says the officials have noth-
ing to say, but adds that the line he
represents is going farther than usual
in the effort properly to care for the
increase in north Pacific coast traf-
fic and that the officials are diligently
seeking detailed information as to
the possibilities and natural advan-
tages. Mr. Cox has been instructed by
his people to obtain promptly all sta-
tistical matter possible with regard to
crops and conditions, including wheat,
barley, flax, hops, sugar beets, live-
stock, poultry and dairying, mining,
fishing, climate, etc., all for incorpo-
ration in a new booklet of extensive
character on "The Pacific Northwest"



COMPETITION NOTES.

Answers to Questions From
Competitors, and Notes of In-
terest to Everyone.

The Contest Manager has been hav-
ing questions hurled at him in great
shape during the past 24 hours. It
won't be possible to answer them all
today, but here are a few answers.
Others will appear later. In some
cases two or three persons have asked
the same question—of course one
answer will do for all.

Questions and Answers.

Does a person have to enter both
contests? No.

How many words should be in the
article on advertising? From 1000 to
1500.

How large should the advertisement
be? From one-quarter of a page to
a full page.

Can one person win both prizes?
Yes, if he tries for both and the judges
decide he deserves them.

Will manuscripts written in lead
pencil be allowed? No, if written in
lead pencil they will be disqualified.
Who will be the judges? The names
will be announced later. Competent
persons not connected with the Jour-
nal staff will be chosen.

What is the last date for submitting
copy to insure it being passed upon?
February 20, at 5 p. m. Copy must be
in the Journal office by that time.

Can a contestant submit more than
one article or advertisement? Yes,
he can send in several, but a separate
envelope with name slip must be
pinned to each.

Will the judges know the names of
the contestants? No. Names of con-
testants must be enclosed in sealed
envelopes and the envelopes pinned
to the manuscripts.

How large is a quarter page? A
quarter page is 30 inches. It may be
two columns wide and 15 inches deep,
or three columns wide and 10 inches
deep. A half page may be three full
columns, or six columns wide and 10
inches deep. A full page is six col-
umns wide and 20 inches deep.

Are the 200 words on classified ad-
vertising to be written separately?
No, they should be a part of the ar-
ticle. For instance, if you write an
article of 1000 words, 200 words should
be about classified advertising and 800
about newspaper advertising in gener-
al. You needn't count the exact num-
ber of words, but they should be in
about that proportion.
