

DADS MEET

City Has Rather Tame Meeting but Pays the Bills

After a tedious session, with very little business of importance transacted, the record of last night's meeting of the city council. A number of bills against the city were introduced, the upper floor of the city was rented to the militia company for another year at the rate of \$100 per month, and a number of new sidewalks were ordered constructed. These were the only things of importance upon which final action was taken.

The ordinance committee reported favorably upon the bill which had been referred to them in regard to a case for auctioneers, and when it came time for the introduction of new ordinances it introduced a new bill providing that all traveling vendors of merchandise should be made to pay a fee of \$50 before being allowed to sell their goods in this city. This was the first and second times referred back to the committee.

The special committee to which had been referred the matter of the petition of Merrill & Simons to rent the upper floor for a skating rink, and the committee was also instructed to investigate, and see if the use of the floor as an armory was injuring

the building, reported unfavorably upon the first, and made the following report on the second, which, in substance, was that the building was not damaged by its use as an armory.

Upon the recommendation of the committee on sewers, some of the residents in South Salem are to be furnished with lumber for the construction of culverts by means of which a large part of the neighborhood in which they reside will be drained.

The committee to which had been referred the rules of the council for revision recommended that the rules be amended so that the council should meet on the first and third Mondays in each month, instead of on Tuesdays, and also that a section be added providing for the order in which the police and other officers should be elected. Both recommendations were adopted, and hereafter the council will meet on Monday night.

The city recorder made his report, showing collections for the month of January as follows: Fines, \$50; licenses, \$585.50; fees, \$240; poll tax, \$3.00. Total, \$670.90.

The city attorney submitted a written report of the status of the case of the City of Salem vs. Hattie McGinnis, but the report was simply filed, without giving him any instructions as to how they wished him to proceed in the matter. It seemed to be the opinion of the members of the council that the matter should be allowed to rest until the attorney had had more time to look into the case, and see if he thought it practical to appeal from the decision of Judge Galloway, which knocks out the ordinance, and carry the case up to the supreme court.

The attorney also notified the council that there is a damage suit of \$100 pending against the city, and he was instructed to take such action as he thought proper. This is the case in which Miss Liston sued the city for injuries alleged to have been caused by a defective cross-walk.

He also reported that the case of S. T. Richardson against the city has been dismissed in the justice court.

Upon the recommendation of Alderman Low, chairman of the committee on fire and water, a hydrant was ordered installed at the corner of Commercial and Division streets.

Attorney Webster Holmes appeared before the council and addressed the members with a view to ascertaining as to what would be the future policy in regard to having the marshal strictly enforce all ordinances until they could be codified. He called attention to the recent decision of the circuit court which made one of the ordinances invalid, and suggested that the city might be involved in a costly damage suit.

The members of the council seemed to regard this as an unheard of proceeding, and, after a short discussion, during which it was brought out that the marshal did not need any other orders than those which he took upon himself when taking the oath of office, the matter was allowed to drop.

On motion of Alderman Gesner a committee, consisting of the mayor, Gesner, Wallace and Lowe were appointed to ascertain the cost of suitable furniture and improvements for the council chamber.

Fire Chief Savage recommended that some supplies be purchased for the Yew Park department, and a motion making such an order was carried.

An order was made authorizing the street commissioner and the street committee to dispose of the old horse which has been used on the city dump cart for so many years, and to purchase another at a price not to exceed \$150.

Alderman Wallace introduced an ordinance to repeal the ordinance licensing slot machines, and to refund the unearned portions of said licenses. This was read the first and second time and referred to the ordinance committee.

ordinance amending the saloon ordinance so as to omit that part of the penalty which makes a forfeiture of a license, upon conviction, for Sunday opening. It was referred to the ordinance committee, after a motion to lay on the table had been lost by a vote of 5 to 7.

Alderman Low, of the fire and water committee, submitted a report on the needs of his department, and a committee was appointed to investigate the cost of the recommendations that he made, which were principally the purchase of a chemical engine, and the construction of cisterns near the school houses.

TROOPS FOR ALASKA.

Canadian Authorities May Not Allow Them to Travel Via White Pass.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 7.—A regiment of infantry will soon be sent to stations in Alaska to replace the Third Infantry, which has been on duty in that territory. It is desired to have these troops taken under contract by the route which goes through Canadian territory, which is more convenient than other lines of travel, in addition to which it is open for a longer period each year. The question has arisen, however, whether the Canadian authorities will give permission for an armed body representing this government to pass through the dominion. There was some talk of obtaining permission through the state department, but the proposition which has more general favor is the award of a contract with the stipulation that the railroad shall be responsible and shall obtain the requisite authority from Canada, and, if it is not obtainable, the contractors shall deliver the troops at their destination without additional expense to the U. S. government.
