MATTER ONLY OF METHODS

Cannery Is Certain to Go But Location Has Not Yet Been Selected

The outgrowth of the cannery meeting held last Tuesday, while those present seem to have been somewhat unsettled as to what they wanted at that time, now appears to be getting down to a rational business situation. The stock is subscribed and the sturdy fruit-growers do not propose to take a backward step in the matter of having a cannery. The all important question now is, how shall it be secured, how shall it be operated, where shall it be placed, and what is going to be the most feasible method of conducting the business successfully? The proposition of Mr. Holcomb to sell his cannery site near the depot, to furnish warehouse facilities, and further, if deemed advisable, to finance the year's output, was turned down perhaps without due consideration. The committee in whose hands the matter has been placed approved of this proposition and thought it could be made to work out advantageously to all parties, but this the meeting could not see.

Mr. Allen's proposition may also have had more merit than the meeting felt disposed to accord it with. However, this may be, the whole matter is getting nearer to a consummation as a result of these propositions.

It is now proposed that the directors purchase the Holcomb site outright, without strings, without a warehouse proposition, and without immediate expectation of having Mr. Holcomb or his company finance the business. Mr. Holcomb seems to favor this plan, and says that whatever is to the interests of the fruit growing fraternity will ultimately be to his interest as a packer and wholesale operator. For this reason he is inclined to make some concessions, and it is to be hoped that the directors can at an early date pull themselves together and agree upon a definite plan of action, either with Mr. Holcomb or through some other channel.

The executive committee of the board of directors is busy sifting the merits of the various propositions for the purchase of a site, and it is hoped that within a few days will be able to announce their decision. The expectation is to have a building erected, machinery installed and all the necessary arrangements made for receiving fruit by the time the season opens. Salem is to be congratulated upon the wisdom and activity of the fruit-growers of the surrounding country, who are so energetically pushing this matter.

Progress and Meat Eating.

And through all the stages of the evolution, it has been the meat-eating animals alone that have developed into higher form. The vegetable diet has ever been indicative of lowliness and helplessness. The patient ass, the docile ox, the timid hare, the drudging horse, the fleeing deer, the herbivorous animals. They are and always have been the legitimate prey of the carnivorous animals. They furnished food and sustenance for the aggressive lion and tiger, the wolf and the dog. The highest development of life at present is found in the class of apes that subsist on both vegetable and meat diet and in man, whose diet is the same. The monkey that confined itself to vegetables failed to develop into a higher scale of life, just as the vegetarian man fails to advance in civilization.

Vegetarianism is productive of degeneration, and hence the failure of the herbivorous animals to progress as have the carnivorous. A vegetable diet has always been more easily attainable than an animal diet. Therefore, certain animals through their incompetency to cope with other animals in the battle of life were forced to feed on shrubs and trees, the diet attained with least risk and greatest ease. But development and progress is bought with combat and labor, and this is why the meat-eating animal has reached the highest stage of development. Even with man, a vegetable diet is cheaper and more easily attainable than a meat diet, but the man who confines himself to vegetable foods will suffer in the race of progress with the one who eats both meat and vegetables.—What to Eat.

PAINT FACTORY GOING

Oregon Sienna Paint Works Stock Being Rapidly Taken

The committees on the Co-operative cannery and on the Oregon-Sienna Paint Factory are meeting with great success, and both enterprises can be set down as assured facts. Members of the Greater Salem Commercial Club and the Salem Business Men's League are not only working on the committees, but are liberally subscribing for stock in these enterprises.

D. H. Weyant, who has charge of the subscriptions to the Paint Factory, is enthusiastic in his undertaking, and has between 15,000 and 16,000 shares of stock taken. When the 30,000 mark is reached, the contract for the building will be let, and a factory to grind and manufacture all kinds of house paint on a large scale will be added to Oregon Industries located at Salem. Mr. Weyant and an expert will go to the mine in Lane county this week, and submit a final test report to the board of directors, that is composed of some of the strongest men financially in Western Oregon. This will be a great source of wealth to this country, as it will be taking raw material that exists in unlimited quantity, and by a simple process of manufacture put on the market an article for which there is an unlimited demand all over the Northwest.

CONTEST MANAGER.

Law is Mandatory.

Attorney-General Crawford yesterday afternoon rendered an opinion, in which he holds that the law passed by the last legislature, providing for state and county health officers is mandatory. This law says that the county judge, together with the commissioners, shall constitute a board of health, and that this board shall elect a secretary, who shall be a graduate physician of some medical college, and shall have been regularly admitted to practice in this state by the state board. This secretary is to be known as the health officer.

The attorney-general is of the opinion that mandamus proceedings can be instituted to compel compliance with the law.
