Naming Coast Defense Batteries.
New York, Feb. 8.—The war department has issued a general order announcing the names for the new coast defense batteries near this city. The battery at Fort Hancock has been named Battery Alexander McCook, in honor of Major General Alexander McCook, U. S. A., who served with distinction during the Civil War and who died on June 12, 1903.

The battery at Fort Wadsworth has been named Battery Charles Mills, in honor of Brevet Colonel Charles J. Mills, U. S. V., who served with distinction in the Civil War and was killed in action at Hatcher's Run, near Petersburg, Va., March 31, 1863.

The battery at Fort Hamilton has been named Battery Abraham Johnston, in honor of Captain Abraham R. Johnston, 1st U. S. Dragoons, who was killed in action at San Pasqual, Cal., December 6, 1846.

The battery at Fort Schuyler was named Battery Clough Overton, in honor of Colonel Clough Overton, 15th U. S. cavalry, who was killed in action at Suclatan, Province of Misamis, Mindanao, Philippine Islands, on May 15, 1903.

Another battery at Fort Hamilton was named Battery Samuel Spear, in honor of Brevet Brigadier General Samuel Spear, U. S. Vol., who served with distinction in the Civil War and who died on May 4, 1876.

Iowa Lumbermen in Session.
Davenport, Ia., Feb. 8.—The ninth annual meeting of the Southwestern Iowa Retail Lumbermen's association opened here this morning with a large attendance of prominent lumbermen from all parts of the state particularly the southwestern parts.
