Quaint Dutch Silverware.

Happy the little bride who finds a piece of quaint hand carved Dutch silver among her wedding gifts. Aside from its beauty of workmanship it brings with it a breath of the Netherlands, for in its shape and decoration Holland speaks.

Windmills, boats, wooden shoes, cows, peasants, storks—these are the characteristic things which the Dutch silverware brings with it. Every collection of the bride's can be furnished with specimens of Dutch silver. For the toilet tables there are boxes which might have tempted Pandora, so wonderful is their ornamentation, hinting of fascinating contents. One \$50 box has a lid which may be lifted in four sections, each section showing an exquisitely carved picture. There are perfume bottles of crystal in silver confines, boxes for powder and patches, bonbonnières, candlesticks, hatpins—all bearing the mark of Holland.

For the curio cabinet there are many little trinkets which might have graced the tables of Titania herself. Fairy like aedon chairs, boats, windmills, animals, chairs and Dutchmen in wooden shoes and wide breeches.

Spoons range in size and shape from the long handled lemonade, with hollow space through which to draw the lemonade as through a straw to the grotesque, broad salad spoon. One spoon shows a boat for the handle and the shore for the bowl. One shows a pastoral scene in the bowl and a waterboy carrying water on the handle. The spoons are attractive, so are the grape tongs, which remind one of the old nursery rhyme. "Long came a blackbird and snipped off her nose." They have such an aggressive "beak." Something new in almond spoons in the ring handle, familiar to those who invest in nursery spoons. The mustard and salt spoons are almost tiny enough to hold a grain of these condiments. One of the prettiest receptacles for bonbons is a three cornered hat.—What to Eat.

ACROSS THE RANGE.

Justice Halley Makes a Flying Visit to Boise, Idaho.

Justice Halley returned this morning from a short business trip to Pendleton. He also ran up to Boise to spend Sunday with his parents, and while there was rendered a reception by his many old-time friends. At the instance of the members of the supreme court, he occupied a seat on the bench with them Monday to hear the arguments in a very interesting case.

The judge says that everything in and around Pendleton is in a prosperous condition, while Boise City is humming. Not the least among her many improvements being the building of some 30 blocks of new pavement. Pendleton is also preparing to pave two of her principal streets, and he says that the prospects for a good grain crop in Umatilla county are bright.

No snow was found around Pendleton or Boise, but there was plenty of it in Baker valley, and the sleighing in Baker City was good.

FRENCH GIFT IS RECEIVED.

Splendid Piece of Gobelin Tapestry for Miss Roosevelt.

Washington, Feb. 8.—Miss Alice Roosevelt yesterday received the wedding present which the French government had intended for her. The gift consists of a beautiful Gobelin tapestry, representing "Justice," and was offered to Miss Roosevelt by M. Jeaunand, the French ambassador in this city.

It is understood that President Roosevelt had informed several European powers that it would not be agreeable if they sent especially expensive gifts, and accordingly most European governments are expected to send small gifts, merely to express their good will and wishes to the daughter of America's first citizen, but the French government had already given orders for the manufacture of this rare piece of tapestry. The piece, though not very large, is invaluable, as that particular kind of Gobelin is solely made for the French government on special occasions.

Collar of Pearls Cuba's Gift.

Havana, Feb. 8.—Dr. Ferrer, the Cuban minister to Paris, reports that he has purchased a collar of pearls as Cuba's wedding gift for Miss Alice Roosevelt, and that the gift will be forwarded to Mr. Quesada, Cuban minister at Washington.

STATE NEWS

Seven miles of water mains are soon to be laid in Eugene by the new company.

The Chemawa girls' basketball team will go to Corvallis Friday to play the O. A. C. girls' team.

The Oregon Agricultural College is to have a new Y. M. C. A. building, which is to be erected immediately.

Mrs. Floyd Williams, an O. A. C. graduate, is coaching the Baker City and La Grande high school girls' basketball teams.

Local trainmen have been notified along the line of the Southern Pacific that they will have to pass an examination as to their eye sight and hearing.

Springfield people will vote on the proposition of issuing \$10,000 bonds for a new school house. The building is to be a two-story frame building, with a stone basement.

"Reedsport" is the name of a new town which is to be established soon near Gardiner by Warren P. Reed, the Gardiner capitalist, and from whom the town will get its name.

The Coquille Recall, edited by J. R. Ingle, has changed hands. Orville Dodge, of Myrtle Point, having purchased the paper. Mr. Dodge was formerly editor of the Western Oregonian, published at Myrtle Point.

Considerable excitement has been created at Junction City by the arrest of six men, and the conviction of five of them for gambling. Two men were fined \$100 each, and the other three \$50 each.

John Ellis, of McCoy, created quite a furor of excitement at that place Saturday night, when he attacked James White with a carving knife, and cut him badly in the face and legs. He was drunk at the time. Both men have always been good friends.

Seeks Aid for Chinese Lepers.

New York, Feb. 8.—The Rev. Father Conrardy, who was a companion and co-worker of Father Damian, has returned to the United States to further the establishment of leper stations in the vicinity of Canton, China. He is a Belgian by birth and began his priestly labors in India in connection with the French society as Missions Etrangères of Paris and Lyons. Then he worked for 14 years among the Indians in Oregon, where he heard of Father Damian at Molokai and spent eight years there with him.

Later Father Conrardy entered the Portland, Ore., Medical college and was graduated with the degree of M. D. in 1900. He then made his way to Canton, China, and placed himself at the disposal of Bishop Chausse, the vicar apostolic, but as the country was then disturbed by war the time was not considered opportune for missionary work. The present bishop, Monsignor Merol, has taken up the work, however, and has authorized Father Conrardy to lecture and work up interest in behalf of the Canton lepers. Father Conrardy has lectured in several large cities in Belgium and raised several thousand dollars for the proposed settlement.

The property of Henry Schenck, was taken from in front of the Christian Science church, while the wheel belongs to Frank Frickey, taken from in front of the United church. The moral of which may be, don't go to church, or if you walk.

The wheels will probably be turned to Salem this afternoon, descriptions and photographs of men are also expected.
