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EDITORIAL TRUTHS TERSELY TOLD

Another candidate for state senator has filed his nomination declaration and solemnly takes pledge No. 1 of the Direct Primary law. This would indicate that the sentiment of leaving the choice of a senator to the direct vote of the people has considerable support among conservative Republicans. The idea is a growing one, and will receive support at the hands of the people regardless of party. The man who does not take the pledge is going to be put on the defensive, and will be accused of having intentions to gain personal advantage from his being sent to the legislature. And what difference is there between buying a man's vote with a fat postoffice or with the same amount in cash? Would it not be better to leave the selection of a senator entirely to the direct vote of the people, just as we leave the selection of a congressman and a governor and all other important officers? The character of such officials ranks quite as well as that of United States senators, and the reputations of legislators for grafting the senatorship is well established.

The Willamette valley is destined to undergo a rapid development in the near future. The construction of the Willamette valley railway is being pushed, and will certainly be built from Portland to Salem, Albany and Eugene. It may not go to Roseburg at present. As soon as it is in operation it will cut passenger fares and freight rates, and give multiplied convenience for travel that will help fill up the valley with people, and result in establishing many new centers of trade. The United Railways corporation that is putting a large banking house into Portland, and has acquired the Portland, Hillsboro and Forest Grove franchise, is represented at Portland by Mr. Larrabee and five other Los Angeles capitalists, with plenty of money behind them, and what is better, large practical experience at building electric roads. This company and the Willamette valley road corporation have had a hard time getting any kind of a franchise at Portland, and there must be mismanagement of some kind, as the city, the whole interior and those corporations have an immense mutual interest in the early passage of these franchises and the beginning of this development work at an early day. Every month frittered away means a delay in this, the richest region laying out of doors, attaining to its own—the homes of a million prosperous, happy people, in the best climate for the great middle class in the civilized world. The Journal bids all these enterprises Godspeed in Western Oregon.

VOTERS ON THE ROLLS

Registration Clerk Kept on the Jump to Accommo- date Applicants

During the past week Registration Clerk Murphy at the county clerk's office has been kept busy.

The registration for the week has been very heavy, and in addition to the names entered in the big register there are fully 500 registrations from outside precincts on hand awaiting entry.

When the books closed last evening, the total registration entered was 2437, of whom 1730 claimed to be Republicans, 487 called themselves Democrats, and 220 proclaimed allegiance to other parties. Adding the 500 names registered on blanks but not yet entered, this gives a total registration of 2937 voters since January 2, or 56 per cent of the total registration in 1904. This is certainly the heaviest registration on record for the first six weeks.

In the city of Salem the total registration so far is 1164, being 877 Republicans, 197 Democrats and 90 from the other parties. This is over 64 per cent of the total in 1904.

Indoor Meet at Richmond.

Richmond, Va., Feb. 10.—The indoor track and athletic meet which will be held at the horse show building this evening, promises to be one of the most interesting and brilliant events of an athletic nature ever held in this city. The college athletes of Virginia, North Carolina, Maryland and other southern states have been looking forward to this event with great interest and they expect great things from it for the future. This will be the first indoor athletic event of this kind that was ever held south of Washington, and it is hoped that it will lead to a great boom of athletics in the south, and that those indoor meets will become a permanent annual event.

The horse show building, in which the meet will be held, is an ideal place for such an event and, next to Madison Square Garden, is the best building for such a purpose in the country. It has a large floor space and an enormous seating capacity. Another advantage is that it is provided with steam heat and the most perfect lighting arrangements to be

found in any building of its character in the country.

The meet will be held under the direction of Dr. Joseph A. Rellly, a former Boston mar and star athlete.

The feature of the meet will be the relay races. Georgetown will be pitted against Virginia Polytechnic institute in a one mile relay race. A three cornered match will be run between the universities of Virginia, North Carolina and George Washington.

Georgetown Preparatory school, which is the fastest high school aggregation in the district, will represent Washington in an inter city relay against the country school boys of Baltimore. Georgetown has two southern champions entered in Seltz for the 50 yard dash, and O'Gorman in the shot put. Seltz broke the record for 60 yards at a meet held in Washington last year, and O'Gorman has already won first place in a Baltimore meet this year in the shot put. Bernard Wefers, the old Georgetown sprinter, will act as starter.

One of the special features will be a two mile hurdle relay race in which the Maryland Athletic club will run against the Columbian Athletic club of Washington. Besides the relay races there will be 50 yard hurdle races, half mile and one mile runs, putting shot, running jump, and other events.
