One of Unidentified.

Last night's Portland Journal says: One of the unidentified bodies at the morgue is that of an aged woman. This fact was determined by a surgeon at the morgue late this afternoon. The body of this woman was found beneath the ruins of the Alpine rooming house, 75 feet west of East Water street and 20 feet north of East Morrison street.

It was taken from the debris near where the body of the unidentified man lay. The unidentified man resembles in size that of Hendree, the photographer who is missing. If this is his body, the woman's body may be that of his wife, and if this is the case the remains of their three children may still be in the ruins.

A canvass was made of the houses in that community today and no trace of the photographer and his family could be found, although it was reported that several days ago they left their apartments in connection with the photograph gallery and took rooms in the Alpine house.

ROAD ON BLALOCK ISLAND

Arlington, Dr., Feb. 13.—Northern Pacific officials are negotiating with Dr. N. G. Blalock, owner of Blalock island, to secure right of way for the North Bank railroad, according to the statement of Dr. Blalock.

On the Washington side of the island there is a high bluff of rock and dirt extending seven miles paralleling the entire length of the island. As the island lies only 200 feet from the Washington side during high water, engineers say that it would be cheaper to bridge the island at each end, thus doing away with construction along this bluff. There are also sharp curves in one or two places along this bluff shore. The grade for the new railroad from Wallula to Portland must be at least seven feet higher than the high-water mark of 1894.

Dr. Blalock says that if the railroad runs through the island he will immediately lay out a site for a new town, as this will be an ideal place for a small city. He owns 16,000 acres of wooded land on the island, and 7000 acres will be platted into five, ten and 20-acre tracts before spring. This can be irrigated by water from the Columbia. A town there would draw considerable trade from Eastern Klickitat and Yakima counties. It would also get business from the famous Horse Heaven country, where thousands of acres are being sown to wheat and other cereals each year.

Basketball Schedule.

Manager Ralph Matthews, of the University basketball team, has arranged the following schedule of games: The varsity will meet the Oregon Agricultural college team February 15th, and a return game will be played in Portland with the Multnomah Athletic Club. The game with the University of Oregon has been arranged for March 3d. A return game will also be given the local Y. M. C. A.

The Boss Way to Spray.

The best outfit I have yet seen for spraying fruit trees is on the farm of J. O. Beardsley, four miles north of Salem. His two sons, Elmer and Walter, have attached an upright steam boiler of about four horse capacity on the rear of a tank of about 250 gallons. To this is attached a steam pump, and by having about 8 pounds pressure in the boiler will give you about 120 pounds on said pump; this gives you a fine pressure at the nozzle, and no difference how cold the material in the tank, it is so hot by the time it reaches the nozzle you cannot hold the iron pipe in your hand with any comfort unless you wear a good glove. And when you spray, going on hot as it does, Mr. Seale, he gives one kick and his life of mischief is ended. I think an application put on hot as this is, is equal to about two sprayings in the usual way.
