WOMAN GETS HER MONEY

The supreme court affirmed the case of J. E. Dickey against G. W. Jackson, in which the plaintiff obtained judgment against Jackson for \$10,400. J. E. Dickey is the woman who lived with Jackson in Portland prior to 1899, and in that year went to Manila to engage in the saloon and restaurant business with him. After their return she claimed half of the profits, and after a trial before Judge Cleland a verdict was rendered in her behalf. The opinion was written by Chief Justice Bean.
