Tramp Libraries.

The state library commission met yesterday afternoon. All the members of the board were present. Miss Marvin made the announcement that Hon. W. B. Ayre had made a gift of \$500 for the use of the commission to provide circulating libraries for various towns throughout the state. Mr. Ayre made a similar gift for the same cause some time ago. The board considered the bids from publishing houses to supply school libraries with books purchased under the 10-cent library law. All the bids were rejected, and a call was issued for March 5th, at which time new bids are to be submitted, conforming with the regulations of the board.

Miss Marvin, the secretary, presented an extensive report of the work done by the library commission. The report showed that traveling libraries have been installed as follows:
