The Republican party is not built up by men who seek nominations and to do so have to belittle or besmear the character of an opponent or aspirant for the same place. The common rule of political decency is to give a man in any party who has filled an office with reasonable satisfaction to the people a second term. The Republican party and the Democratic party has lost prestige and strength whenever it has departed from this custom. The Republicans lost the presidency when they failed to renominate Arthur. The Oregon Republicans lost the governorship when they failed to renominate Geer. The surest way to demoralize the party is to go to trying experiments in the interest of those who merely want places for what there is in them, and care nothing for party principles. Not a point is gained by mud throwing before the primaries. Such methods always leave sore places and insure loss of part of the ticket. There is something can be said against any aspirant for office, but it should not be said by the man who desires the support of the party to get the place.

The direct primary should influence all citizens, and especially working men, to register and take part at the primaries held April 20th. The registration books will be open at the county court house of each county until April 10th, and in the city where the court house is situated voters in that city must go in person to the court house and register. In all other precincts of the county voters can register before a notary or justice of the peace. Not only should voters register, but ask your neighbor if he has registered. If voters support the principles of Roosevelt they can register as Republicans at the primary. Otherwise they can register as Democrats and vote at the Democratic primary held on the same day. But for the purposes of the primary they must register either as Republicans or Democrats, as these are the only two parties, under the law, who can take part in a primary election. All other citizens of other parties can and should register now. Remember under the primary a registered voter has all the powers that a delegate to a county convention formerly exercised. He can vote on the nominee for each office, from constable to committee man, from justice of the peace to Governor and United States senator. Let all try to do their duty. Register, and see that your neighbor registers.

purpose of discussing and promoting good roads, dairying, alfalfa culture, tile drainage, fruit growing and the promotion of all Oregon industries. As two of the gentlemen on the program could not be present, a representative of the brewing and malting business was given the floor and addressed into a discussion of the local option law and its effects on business. As Silverton handles about \$400,000 annually of hops, and grows a great deal of barley, and as Marion county is the center of the hop industry in the Willamette valley, there is no reason why some discussion of this industry should not be permitted. The simple fact remains, if Oregon did not grow these hops other states of the Union would, and if there were no breweries in Oregon to use the barley and hops these products would be manufactured elsewhere, and the product would be sent into Oregon more largely than it is now. There is not a drop of pure noble whiskey drunk in Oregon because it is not manufactured here. The only way to shut out the traffic in these intoxicants is to build cities and found states with provisions in the title deeds that the land shall not be used directly or indirectly for an industry connected with the use or manufacture of liquors, and all communication with the rest of the world cut off. Otherwise Oregon can not consistently grow hops and barley and vote for local option and prohibition measures.
