SALEM SCHOOL BOARD

Transacts Routine Business Provides Library Catalog and Employs Census Enumerator

Salem board of education met at their office in the high school building, all present but Director Byrd, who was absent on account of professional duty. Clerk James Goodale and City Superintendent Powers were present.

The Capital Improvement Co. submitted a proposition for filling grounds around to building at 35 cents per yard, board to hire man to level the same, or 40 cents a yard and level it themselves.

Bernardi & Dunford asked allowance for larger arch on the Park school septic sewage tank of \$22.50; ordered paid. The tank had to be put five feet under the ground, and hence had to have a ten inch brick arch instead of five inch, as planned.

Election of some one to take the school census caused some discussion. The vote stood: C. H. Jones 3, James Eastham 1. Jones was declared elected. This matter was the cause of a deadlock last session and many ballots were taken.

The teachers were ordered paid and it was shown that about \$1700 was on hand and as \$3500 was needed the clerk was ordered to procure a loan on best terms of balance.

On the matter of cataloging books in high school library, record showed that at previous meeting on this subject Byrd and Lee voted to have a catalog. Croison and Condit against it.

The district has about 350 to 400 new books, besides four large dictionaries and an encyclopedia. Supt. Powers explained the catalog work was necessary to handle the books properly. Mr. Condit thought the books should be used as a circulating library, and keep shifting them around from one school to another. As chairman of the board Mr. Condit instructed the rest of the board as to what he thought should be done. He criticized Miss Marvin for saying it would take three weeks to catalog the books. She was working on a salary for the state. Some competent person could catalog these books in a few days. He suggested Miss Phillips for the work. Mr. Epley moved, and it was carried, that City Superintendent Powers be instructed to employ Miss Florella Phillips to catalog the new books.

On motion gas was ordered put in the high school laboratory.

Mr. Epley brought up the question of salary of substitute teachers. Some had been paid \$2 a day, and some two-thirds of the salary. Supt. Powers thought substitutes had a difficult task and should not receive a minimum wage. The point was that at \$2 day a \$55 a month teacher would make \$15 a month hiring a substitute. Mr. Condit suggested paying 90 per cent of the wages of the person whose place they took. The 90 per cent motion was made by Mr. Croison. A teacher was discussed who sometimes loses temper with children and before the principal and even before a member of the board. A number of pupils quit. Another teacher has had trouble in managing her room. Considering the number of new teachers employed and the small wages paid, the board has succeeded very well the past year and there has been little trouble. It is very difficult to secure competent teachers who have had any experience whatever at the salaries paid in Salem. One of the board said a teacher should have at least three years' experience besides normal training to successfully take a place in the Salem schools. Yet, under the present scale of wages they were compelled to employ teachers who had never taught before.

Insurance is still one of the largest items of expense, and all insurance agents were allowed a share of this expenditure, or about \$13 each.

Dallas Victorious.

The most interesting basketball game of the season was played at Dallas Saturday evening between the Dallas college team and the famous Red Wing, Minn., team. The Dallas boys put it all over the eastern men, winning by a score of 15 to 13. The Red Wing team has played 50 games, and this is their first defeat.

Brought to Asylum.

Thomas J. Johnson, an old soldier, and a resident of Eugene was brought to the asylum Saturday, having been adjudged insane.
