CONSIDER DIVORCE PROBLEM

Commissioners From Several States Meet in Wash- ington

Washington, D. C., Feb. 19.—This is the day for the formal opening of the divorce congress, which was called by Governor Samuel Pennypacker, of Pennsylvania, to consider the problems of uniformizing the divorce laws of the different states of the Union. The delegates or commissioners appointed by the governors of the different states, or, at least a great many of them, assembled here last week and held a number of preliminary consultations, in which they exchanged their views on the subject, and compared notes in regard to the divorce laws in force in their respective states.

South Carolina is the only state not represented by commissioners. The reason given by the governor of that state for not appointing a commissioner to the conference was that such appointment would be unnecessary, as the state of South Carolina has no divorce laws.

Governor Pennypacker, the prime mover of the conference, will preside at the formal meetings of the conference. He is by far the most prominent figure of the conference, and, supported by the other representatives of Pennsylvania, C. LaTue Munson, of Williamsport; Walter George Smith and Hon. H. Staake, of Philadelphia, he will undoubtedly take the lead in the deliberations and discussions of the conference.

Among the commissioners attending the conference are many men of prominence, eminently qualified to represent their state in the consideration of so important a problem.

It is expected that the conference will lead to important results and will eventually bring about great uniformity in the divorce laws of the different states. The present condition is so perplexing and undesirable that every improvement will be warmly welcomed. Even in the states where there is the greatest laxity in regard to divorce laws, the people are beginning to see the evils of the existing conditions, and clamor for a change. Marriages contracted in one state are unlawful in another, while divorces obtained in one state are not recognized in others. The greatest difficulty in uniformizing the laws of the various states seems to be the peculiarity of existing conditions in some of the states, and which materially differ from the conditions existing in other states. Another matter which promises to be a great stumbling block is the position taken by the laws of certain states in regard to inter-racial marriages between whites and colored persons.

Conservative members of the conference do not believe that the present conference will be able to agree on any definite basis of uniform divorce laws; but are inclined to believe that the best that can be accomplished at this time is to discuss the various phases and features of the laws in the different states, point out existing defects and leave it to a committee to work out a draft of laws, to be considered by some future conference, and, if approved, to be submitted for approval to the legislative bodies of the various states. It is doubtful that an effort will be made to have a national divorce law introduced in congress, as this might raise the question of constitutionality.

New Rules for Levees.

London, Feb. 20.—The first royal levee under the new rules, requiring all persons attending the levee to have cards of admission, was held this noon at St. James' Palace. As a result of the new arrangements the attendance, though large, was not so large as to cause an overcrowding of the levee salons. Owing to the fact that the court is in mourning on account of the death of King Oscar of Denmark, there was an absence of the usual display and brilliant ceremonial characteristic of royal levees. Among those presented were several Americans. Many of the new members of parliament attended the levee and were graciously received by King Edward.

CENTENNIAL PREPARATIONS

Christian Church Looks Forward to
Event in its History.

The Christian church, or Disciples of Christ, in this country, are preparing for a great centennial celebration in Pittsburgh, Pa., in 1909. In 1809, near that city, Thomas Campbell published his now historic "Declaration and Address," embracing the chief principles for which this religious body stands. The churches we now in the midst of what is known among them as a "Four years' campaign," leading up to the centennial celebration.

This people have certainly made a marvelous growth and now number not less than 1,230,000 members in this country alone. Their membership throughout the world is not less than 1,500,000. In 1832 they numbered 12,000; in 1840, 40,000; in 1860, 225,000; in 1880, 475,000; in 1900, 1,181,000; in 1905, 1,238,000. Last year they raised for all missions \$574,171, for education and benevolence, \$488,932, a total of \$1,063,103.

The Foreign Christian Missionary society, an organization of the church does work in thirteen foreign countries. It supports 466 missionary workers, 40 schools and colleges, over 400

orphans and 18 hospitals and dispensaries. Last year it sent out sixteen new missionaries and it receipts amounted to \$255,922, a gain of \$44,602 over the previous year. The first Sunday in March is known as foreign mission day in this church, and is an especially active and wide spread interest is being taken in the matter this year. It is expected that no less than \$300,000 will be raised.
