Sheriff T. D. Taylor arrived here this morning with C. P. Davis and Moses Taylor, two well-known residents of Umatilla county, who are under arrest to serve terms in the penitentiary.

Davis was convicted at the January term of court for embezzling \$4200 of the county's money while chief bookkeeper under Deputy Sheriff Taylor four years ago, and was sentenced to five years' imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$8000.

Moses Taylor will serve two years for attempted arson of the home and wheat field of his brother-in-law, John Hannister. Taylor is one of Umatilla's wealthiest wheat raisers.
